

Gordie Howe Scores Two As Detroit Red Wings Shut Out Bruins 4-0

BOSTON, Jan. 15 — (AP) — Gordie Howe, National Hockey League's leading scorer, chalked up his 26th and 27th goals tonight as goalie Terry Sawchuk gave the top place Detroit Red Wings a 4-0 shutout over the Boston Bruins.

Howe, who now has a total of 50 points in 40 games, scored without assistance late in the opening period and again, after being set up by Metro Prystai, during the second minute of the middle session.

The two Howe counters came after Marty Pavelich opened the scoring with a blistering 35-foot drive during the fifth minute of action. The last Detroit marker was made by Tracy Leswick who was set up in front of the Boston net by Pavelich with less than four minutes remaining.

Red Wings, who suffered their second loss in 20 games last night when they bowed to New York Rangers 3-2, outplayed the fifth-place Bruins all the way.

Sawchuk was given airtight protection throughout and very few

of the 26 shots against him could be termed dangerous.

Howe now has scored seven times against the Bruins this season. His first successful gesture tonight was a sizzling 25-footer.

Howe being fed by Prystai, Howe found himself draped by rookie Warren Godfrey. But he lugged the Boston defenceman along while driving in to beat goalie Jim Henry with a 10-foot angle shot.

The setback extended the Bruins' longest losing streak of the season to five games.

Whitlock Increases Lead In Hockey Scoring Race

Billy Ford of Halifax added six points to his total to strengthen his hold on third place. Ford has 32 goals and 27 assists for a total of 59 points. In fourth place is the Islanders' Bob Gray with 18 goals and 31 assists for 49 points.

Marcel Clements of the Islanders holds down fifth place with 18 goals and 30 assists for 48 points. Frank King of Halifax and George Robertson of Sydney are in eighth place with 46 points and Bill McDonough with 44 points rounds out the big seven.

"We'll be playing a different type of game against the Miners tonight," stated the Hardrock, whose Islanders came from behind to earn a 2-2 draw with the Maceymen on their last trip here. "I traded a left winger and a right winger to that club and it's up to my players tonight to prove me right or wrong on the move," he added.

"Have heard Dr. Dougan has been forced to resign presidency of your Club due to illness. Please express to him my keen regret at his illness and my hope that he will have a speedy recovery. He has worked tirelessly and fought with every ounce of his energy for his beloved Islanders and has been a most capable member of the League's executive. Feel certain his successor will continue where he has left off and I pledge my support to him in all efforts I believe to be in best interests of League.

Canadiens Score 2-0 Shutout Over Chicago; Habs Now In 2nd Place

CHICAGO, Jan. 15 — (CP) — Montreal Canadiens broke two periods of scoreless hockey with a third-period offensive tonight that defeated Chicago Black Hawks, 2-0, and moved the Habs into second place in the National Hockey League.

The shutout was the sixth of the season for Montreal goalie Gerry McNeil, required to make 32 saves, against only 13 for Al Rollins of the Hawks. The whitewash job was the second in a row suffered on successive nights by the Chicago team, which dropped a 3-0 verdict at Toronto last night.

The close-checking, occasionally rough game was scoreless until 6:28 of the final period when Doug Harvey of the Canadiens was sitting out a tripping penalty incurred at 5:50. Doc Couture of the Hawks took a 15-foot whack at the Montreal goal, blocked by McNeil, and Floyd Curry capturing the rebound, swept into Chicago ice. There, he passed to John McCormack who drove a 10-footer past Rollins for what ultimately proved to be the winning goal.

At 9:53, Bert Olmstead sewed it up for Montreal when he climaxed a carry in by Maurice Richard and Ken Mosdell with blistering drive for the second Canadiens' goal.
