TUESDAY

A request that in all future Government contracts a clause be inserted to provide that a rate of wages of not less than 65 cents per hour be paid for unskilled labour, was made in the form of a resolution passed at the annual meeting of the Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion at Summerside on Saturday.

The highest honor that a Canadian Holstein may win for type is to be classified as "Excellent in Selective Registration. Not more than a dozen animals throughout the Dominion receive this classification yearly. The latest to be admitted to the select circle is Norma Marie Pontiac owned by Colby C. Lewis, Freetown, P. E. I. and bred by Est. of Oliver C. LePage, Rustico.

Norma was officially made "Excellent" by George M. VanPatter, official grader for the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada. He described her as a large, strong, extremely dairy cow, beautifully balanced throughout.

Major Arthur H. Peake of Charlottetown was re-elected president of the Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion at the Provincial Convention held yesterday at Summerside. The official opening and the morning business sessions were held in the Regent Theatre and the afternoon meeting was held at the Legion Home.

At noon the veterans paraded to the war memorial headed by the new Legion Band of Summerside and wreaths were placed. However a heavy rain set in and the March-past was not held, the parade being dismissed on the square.

The steady increase in traffic via the Wood Islands route is clearly demonstrated by the figures shown in August of this year compared to the figures for the same month of 1950. August of last year was the month when the Northumberland Ferries Ltd. were called on to bear the traffic brunt of the railway strike.

During August of this year the service carried 21,238 passengers, 5,559 autos and 911 trucks. This compares favorably with the 21,042 passengers, 5,323 autos and 998 trucks transported in the same month of 1950. Despite the slight increase of 236 autos and 196 passengers.

The immediate adoption of "some form of compulsory military training to ensure proper preparedness in the event of an outbreak of hostilities" was urged in a resolution passed by the Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., at their annual convention in Summerside yesterday.

The resolution emphasized that "the threat of war is always imminent under present unsettled world conditions" and that another war would probably necessitate the immediate and complete mobilization of all the country's resources of manpower and materials.

The meeting also strongly urged that vacancies occurring in the staffs employed by the Provincial Government and the Canadian National Railways be advertised in daily papers in the Province in which the vacancy occurs. Also that the Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion be advised, so that veterans desirous of applying may be kept informed of such openings.

Five persons, including three women, were sent to hospital early Saturday night when two cars collided on the Mount Edward Road at the intersection of the new roadway crossing on the route of the proposed Trans Canada Highway.

Mr. Frank Callbeck, Summerside, driver of the car proceeding east on the new road and his wife, who are still in the Prince Edward Island Hospital. Mr. Callbeck suffered several broken ribs and lacerations, but the full extent of Mrs. Callbeck's injuries have not been determined. She has a broken collar bone and several broken ribs, and it is thought possible she may also have received internal injuries.

Other passengers in the Callbeck car, Mrs. Chesley Robertson and Miss Helen Harkness, were treated for minor injuries and then discharged from hospital. The driver of the other car, Mr. George Cook, Charlottetown, was going north on the Mt. Edward Road when the collision occurred. He also was treated for minor injuries and discharged. The accident was investigated by the R.C.M.P. Both cars were considerably damaged.

WEDNESDAY

Mr. Robert H. Nicholson, Charlottetown, long-time engineer with the Dominion Department of Public Works has retired after 38 years service. He entered the service here in 1913 and his retirement became effective August 31. Last Friday he was the centre of a group of 17 staff members as Mr. H. E. Miller, District Engineer, read a brief address and on behalf of the staff presented him with a Gladstone travelling bag.

OTTAWA, Sept. 4. (Special)—The steel bridge purchased by the government of Prince Edward Island to span the Hillsborough River at Charlottetown is listed in the 1951 report of the Crown Assets Disposal Corporation made public today as "sundry merchandise." Details of the item and sale are: 11 steel railway bridge spans, 7,216,000 pounds, acquired by the Government of Prince Edward Island, Department of Public Works and Highways, Charlottetown, P. E. I., \$469,066. These 11 bridge spans constitute

by far the largest single purchase of bridge material, other smaller spans being purchased from Crown Assets by the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Railway Company, the Canadian National Railways and the Iron Ore Company of Montreal.

Opinion in Ottawa is that P. E. I. Premier Walter Jones got a big bargain in his purchase of the new bridge for the Hillsborough River, provided always that it will fit the terrain without two much alteration or need of buying new steel sections.

One of the first donors to arrive at the Blood Donors clinic held in Charlottetown yesterday was Mr. Gerald J. Maddigan, of 125 Pownall Street, City, who was donating his 100th pint of blood, given over a period of twenty-four years.

A considerable portion of Mr. Maddigan's total was given as whole blood at hospitals in Montreal and at both local hospitals, and while definitely believed to be a record for this Province, figures are unavailable here as to whether it constitutes a record number of donations for Canada as a whole. Other notable donations yesterday were those of Mr. Julius Nielson, 199 Gerald Street, his 45th and Mr. Frank Lacey, 163 Great George Street, who was giving his 24th.

CHILD LOSES EYE — A distressing accident occurred in Summerside on Saturday morning to a three-year-old Kathleen Harris which necessitated the removal of an eye. The child was playing on her kiddie car near the home of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ambrose McInnis, Milton Avenue, when the kiddie car upset and she fell off and when she fell the handle of the little vehicle struck her in the eye. She was rushed to the Charlottetown Hospital where she is still a patient but the eye had been seriously injured and could not be saved. She is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Harris of Lloydminster, Alta. and her mother is the former Florence MacInnis. They have been vacationing in Summerside and were planning on returning home the latter part of this week. — S.

Preliminary deck-clearing work has commenced on the mine-sweepers "Malpeque" and "Westmount", which are tied up to the Bruce, Stewart and Company wharf. The ships were brought to Charlottetown this summer for a \$12,000,000 programme for the conversion and refitting of 34 frigates and mine-sweepers, to be done in the next two years by shipyards in the Maritimes and the St. Lawrence area.

The work, now under way, is preparatory to the ships being towed to Pictou, N. S., where they will enter dry-dock to undergo a thorough examination of the hulls.

Approximately seventy men are presently employed by the company, stated Mr. H. E. MacDonald, general manager. The nature of the work revealed by the hull inspection, and other work taken in hand in the meantime, will determine the number of men ultimately employed.

The largest Grade 1 class in the history of the school, yesterday faced teachers at Queen Square when there were 83 new enrollments and 10 repeaters showed up for the new term.

Today enrolling at the school yesterday were 849 pupils, with the likelihood of this number being added to by the end of the week when the last of the vacationers return from journeys or summer cottages. As it is the number represents a small increase over last year when 645 registered.

Throughout the city there were 2,180 pupils enrolling in the four public schools, a decrease of 14 from last year's total. However, in all schools it is expected that upwards of 25 more pupils will register at the end of the week.

At Queen Square School the teachers have a big task in trying to take care of all the pupils present. In the 10 grades they now have to use 19 classrooms, and report they could make good use of at least five or six more.

At West Kent School the temporary figures for yesterday's enrollment showed a decrease of 19 from the 450 entering on opening day in 1950. However, reservations have been made for upwards of 30 more who will arrive later this week.

THURSDAY

The expected heavy fall run of mackerel which should be starting soon is expected to help Island fishermen recoup some of their losses incurred as a result of a poor catch of cod and other ground fish along the north side of the Island.

With the exception of North Lake the catch of cod and mackerel has been far below average all along the North Shore. In the well known fishing area of Rustico most of the present catch is hake, an inferior fish which brings considerably lower return to the fishermen than the cod or mackerel.

Fine weather and an attendance of more than three thousand people contributed to the success of the twenty-fifth annual Prince County Exhibition at Alberton yesterday afternoon.

Lester Profit, president of the Exhibition Association welcomed the visitors. Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse officially opened the exhibition. Other speakers included Senator G. H. Barbour, Attorney General W. E. Darby and Mr. J. W. Don Campbell, M.L.A.

Much favorable comment was heard on the increased size of the new exhibition building and on the industry of the directors in having it ready in time for the exhibi-

tion. The old building was destroyed by a storm in July.

Exhibits were all of good quality, although the entries in some classes were less than in some previous years. There were large showings of cattle, sheep and swine.

Horses were judged by Robert Chappell of York. There was a marked decrease in the number of horses entered but all animals were of good quality. Very few young horses and only two foals were shown. F. C. Ramsay of Montrose was the largest exhibitor.

The satisfactory experience of fire underwriters here is reflected in the announcement that insurance rates on private dwellings and their contents are being reduced by approximately 20 per cent. This will apply to practically all private dwellings within the city limits, and the rates are applicable to new and renewal business.

The low incidence of fires in private dwellings here is responsible for the reduction which is being made under the authority of the P. E. I. Board of Fire Underwriters.

Similar reductions will apply in Summerside.

The annual meeting of the Georgetown Branch No. 16, Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., was held in the Legion Hall on Thursday, August 30th, with Branch President, J. W. Lavers, in the chair.

The proposed site for a new hall was the main topic of discussion at a meeting of interested residents of the Spring Park area, held in the Spring Park Hall last night, with Mrs. R. E. Morrison presiding, Mayor B. Earle MacDonald, of Charlottetown, M. L. A. for Fifth Quarters, was present at the meeting by special invitation.

The site on which the hall, approximately eighty feet long and thirty feet wide, is to be built, lies to the east of the Spring Park School on low lying ground, with a stream flowing through. Considerable filling will have to be done and a culvert or breastwork constructed to confine the stream, particularly when the spring run-off occurs. Methods and cost of doing this work were discussed, and questions were put to Mr. MacDonald as to whether Government help could be expected, other than financial, in general drainage of the area. It was pointed out that upwards of two hundred and fifty children would be using the hall for musical instruction, and mud conditions were creating considerable difficulties.

FRIDAY

Representing the St. George's Junior Farmers, Miss Anne Keefe was the first prize winner at the Public Speaking Contest held in the Kingsboro Hall on Tuesday night. Mr. Morris Deacon, Fieldman for the Provincial Department of Agriculture, acted as chairman, with about 75 persons in attendance.

George MacDonald, of the St. George's Club was second, Charles Somers, of the St. George's Junior Farmers third, and Joseph Cheverle, representing the East Point Junior Farmers, was fourth.

Three-year-old John William Creed, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Creed of Sturgeon passed away yesterday morning in the King's County Hospital at Montague from injuries received when he ran in front of a grain binder at his home.

On Tuesday afternoon while the men were in the field cutting grain, young Johnny slipped quietly into the field and made his way in front of the binder. Before he was seen the blade had struck the little boy on the legs and mangled them severely. He was immediately taken to the King's County Hospital for treatment, where he was carefully attended. However, he passed away in the early hours of yesterday morning.

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, returned yesterday from the second annual Conference of Ministers and Deputy Ministers of Agriculture held in Victoria, B. C., with news that the next conference is to be held in Prince Edward Island in 1952. This year's meetings occupied two days and covered a wide range of subjects of common interest to the different Provinces. Considerable attention was given to the problem of land use and con-

servation, and it was unanimously conceded that agriculture is to be maintained on a strong and solid basis a policy associated with long range basic farm management is an urgent necessity.

The 1951 Cancer Campaign in Charlottetown got away to a good start last night. The opening gun was fired at an enthusiastic supper meeting at the Charlottetown which was well attended and which was honored by the presence of His Honor the Lt.-Governor, T.W.L. Prowse.

Councillor W.H. Beaton, General Chairman for the City Cancer Campaign, opened proceedings in a short talk. He stated that he was particularly fortunate in securing Mr. E.M. Robinson, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, for this very important special drive. He stressed the special part played by the "Special Names" drive played in the general cancer campaign. Councillor Beaton said he felt sure that as usual the "Special Names" canvass would be successful.

Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, O.B.E., Provincial President of the Canadian Cancer Society, opened his remarks by extending his personal thanks to Governor Prowse for attending the opening function of the Cancer Campaign.

"It is a special privilege to have His Honor with us," said Dr. MacMillan. "This is the first time we had the Governor with us at the opening meeting although until he became Governor we have had Mr. Prowse on previous drives as one of our best workers."

Several important changes involving appointments and transfers of members of the Roman Catholic clergy have been announced by Rev. P. F. MacDonald, Chancellor of the Diocese.

Rev. J. P. O'Hanley, Ph.D., of St. Dunstan's University staff, is leaving following his appointment as an C. A. F. chaplain. Rev. William Simpson, Bursar at the University has been named head of the Extension Department at St. Dunstan's, and Rev. F. P. Aylward, Administrator of Brae Parish, has been named to succeed him.

Rev. Louis B. Dooley, Curate of Tignish, was appointed Administrator of Brae Parish, and Rev. Denis Gallant, who was ordained this year, is replacing him at Tignish. Appointments involving other recently ordained priests include Rev. Francis Bolger, appointed to the staff at St. Dunstan's Basilica; Rev. Claude Shea, to be Curate at Seven Mile Bay; Rev. Reginald Phelan to be Curate at Tracadie.

Rev. James Kelly, of the staff of St. Dunstan's Basilica, has been appointed to the teaching staff at St. Dunstan's University and is leaving later this month for Toronto for a two-year post-graduate study course. Rev. Allan MacDonald and Rev. Thomas McLellan, who are doing post-graduate studies last year, will now be on the staff at the University.
