## Island Requires 700 Men For Fall Potato Harvest

At a dominion-provincial meeting held recently in Charlottetown, agreement was reached on the transportation of potato pickers from the mainland to Prince Edward Island.

Stewart C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, represented the Province, and Chris Belyea of Moncton, Blanche Hogg of Summerside and J. Allan Murphy of Charlottetown represented the National Employment Service, department of labor.

Agreement was reached on the payment of transportation costs of pickers from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to the NES offices in Charlottetown and Summerside, and when needed from these offices to a pick-up point suitable to the farmers.

The methods of harvesting potatoes has changed greatly over the last few years as more and more mechanical pickers have come into use. The old beater-digger, followed by a gang of kids with baskets, loading into horse-drawn dump carts is fast becoming a thing of the past; similarly the work-force has changed. Men are needed now, not children, to handle the bags off the diggers and the other heavy work.

It is estimated that about 700 men will be needed, with about three-quarters of them going to the Summerside office.

The bulk of these harvest hands will be drawn from New Brunswick.

With a god-blight-free crop of potatoes in sight, it is hoped that the \$6 per day plus board offer by Island farmers, will attract a sufficient number of these workers to the province.

## Dewar-Owned Holsteins Have Top Record

Indicative of the quality sometimes found in prominent dairy families, is the performance of a mother-daughter combination in the herd of J. Lincoln Dewar, New Perth.

The record of his two-year old heifer, Bargate Cindy Dale, was published a few days ago and it gave her a breed class average production — a comparison with other Holsteins across Canada — of 144 per cent in milk, 177 in fat, which is unusually high.

Her mother, Bargate Bonny Dale, has produced 15,465 pounds milk, 660 pounds butterfat for an average test of 4.35 per cent. Her BCAs are 144 in milk, 171 in butterfat, which are also unusually high.

Incidentally, the average production for the Bargate Holstein herd of 21 cows in milk for the past year was 12,695 pounds milk, 499 pounds butterfat for average BCAs of 124 milk, 133 fat.

Mr. Dewar said that in his herd of 21 producing cows there were 10 first-calf heifers — they were two-year olds — and five were three-year-olds, which makes the average production that more impressive.

## Tobacco Field Day Sept. 9 To Show Crop Processing

The tobacco field day for the benefit of farmers who are interested in becoming producers of the new Island crop, will be held Thursday, Sept. 9, it was learned from Doug Kirkpatrick, in charge of tobacco field work for the provincial department of agriculture.

From there they will go about 2:30 p.m. to the farm of Marcel Moyaert, Upper Montezue, where they will see the tobacco tied by machine. They will also learn something of the method Mr. Moyaert uses for "sucker-ing" the crop by oil instead of hand pulling, the oil — it is applied by an applicator — kills the suckers.

The visit to the farm of John Powers, Greenfield, is planned for 3:30 p.m. Mr. Kirkpatrick said, Mr. Powers also tied by machine and he used propane in his heaters for curing the leaves.

## Over 500 Islanders Apply Under Student Loan Program

Under the Canada student loan program, 517 students in this province have applied to date for \$392,567 in loans to assist them in their college education.

Deputy minister of education, Malcolm MacKenzie, said yesterday this province has been allotted \$248,000 this year from the federal treasury to take care of student loans.

Mr. MacKenzie said "we are informing the federal treasury department immediately that the amount applied for exceeds our allotment." He pointed out that last year a similar situation arose and the province was granted an increase in its 1964 allotment. "We are hopeful," he said, "that Ottawa will increase the loan amount again this year."

## United Church Women Hold Weekend Meet

Women of the United Church of Canada from as far distant as Port Daniel, Quebec, and Donkin, Cape Breton, have assembled in Stanhope for the weekend conference.

It is the first of its kind to be held in the Maritimes and one of five in Canada at Kingston, Hamilton, Missou Lodge, Ontario and Banff, Alta.

Rev. Gwenyth Hubble of the World Council of Churches, New York, is theme speaker, and Mrs. Ralph Collins of Ottawa is Bible study leader.

Miss Hubble, an ordained minister of the British Baptist Church, was for a number of years principal of the Missionary Training College, Selly Oak, England. A few years ago she joined the staff of the International Missionary Council and following the meeting of the World Council of Churches in New Delhi, she became a staff member of the Division of World Vision and Evangelism of the World Council of Churches.

Mrs. Collins and her husband, Rev. Ralph Collins, were missionaries in Angola, Africa, and in 1947 they moved to Dondi to take charge of the theological school. In 1958 they returned to Canada and Mrs. Collins is now on the staff of the English department at Carleton University.

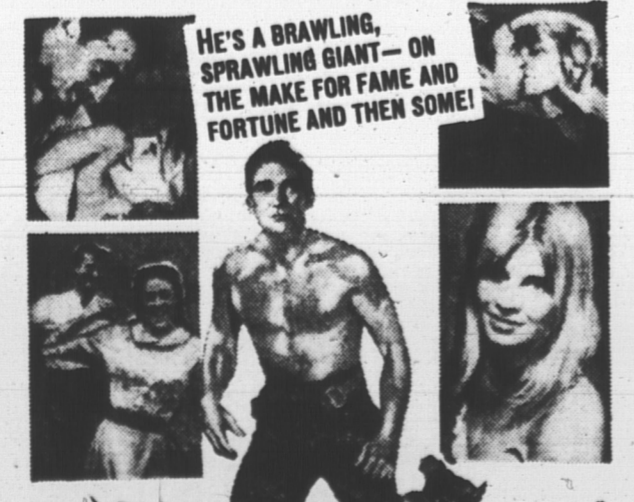
