NEW YORK, June 16—(AP)—A former United States Army technician who the Government said worked on the atom bomb was charged today with supplying atomic secrets to a wartime Russian spy ring.

F.B.I. agents, who seized the 28-year-old ex-army man Thursday night, identified him as David Greenglass of Manhattan.

He was arrested at his home in New York City, where he was living with his wife and two children.

Scores Political Patronage System At Lennox Island

OTTAWA, June 16—(Special)—Charges of political patronage in connection with Indian affairs were launched in the Commons today by both Government and Opposition supporters.

Rev. J. Douglas McNeill of Summerside arrived home late Thursday night after completing a holy year pilgrimage to Rome and a European tour.

At Lennox Island, Mr. McNeill said, "all the money was handed out under a patronage system. Is this new pension the Indians get also under the patronage system as pointed out by the member for Fraser Valley?"

Both Mr. Cruickshank and Mr. Fulton had complained that in British Columbia when an Indian was purchasing his supplies, he was definitely directed to the store where he was to buy them.

10,000th Phone Installed in P.E.I.

The Island Telephone Company passed another milestone yesterday as they installed the Province's 10,000th telephone in the St. John's Residence on Fitzroy Street.

The Company's growth has become evident since they issued telephone No. 1 to the late Peter Stewart on Sydney Street.

They now handle 37,000 local calls a day in Charlottetown as well as 700 long distance calls daily.

Local calls in Summerside total 11,000 and long distance calls about 350 daily.

150 employees in addition to the agents in the smaller exchanges are employed by the Company.

There are 55 operators in Charlottetown while Summerside with the dial system has only a dozen.

Since the outbreak of the war the number of telephones has more than doubled in the Province as there were only 4,347 phones in service in 1939.

The Company is carrying out a big cable extension program which they hope to complete this year.

Plans for the dial system in Charlottetown are underway and the phones will be installed as soon as possible.

Acadia University Professor Dies

WOLFVILLE, N. S., June 16—(CP)—Dr. William Hutchins, 81, professor emeritus of Old Testament literature and religious education at Acadia University here, died today following a long illness.

He was past president of the Maritime United Baptist Convention.

It was the second loss for the University in two days. Wednesday Dr. Ernest Sheldon, head of the mathematics department for the past year, died while vacationing in Edmonton, Alta. He was 60, and was born at Portland, Ont.

eral Government) have is to go to the court we mentioned, namely the Exchequer Court where experts will represent the Government and the owners will have their own experts there to give evidence.

"I am sure the judge will give the proper decision and that amount will be paid. That is the real cause of this delay with regard to the building. But I would not despair if I were the honorable member. I would go home next week just the same and repeat the promise, because the building is coming; when I do not know."

The Minister declined to answer a question from J. L. Gibson, independent member for Comox-Alberni, B.C. who wanted to know how much money was involved in the Charlottetown building. He wanted to know, Mr. Gibson said, because he "would like to see how much it costs to buy a vote in Prince Edward Island."

A. L. Smith, Progressive Conservative member for Calgary West insisted there was nothing to stop Mr. Fournier from taking over the disputed building in Charlottetown now that his Department had expropriated them.

"When I am forcefully taking property from people," Mr. Fournier rejoined, "I do not like to just throw them out. We have tried to deal with some of these people. When I was not satisfied with the other valuations, I even sent people from Montreal to get a third valuation. I do not think we can come to an agreement."

"We shall have to get a judgment and pay the amount awarded by the Court. There are businesses located in these buildings. I think one or two banks are located there. Just to go there without having a judgment and to say 'get out' is something I do not like to do. That is what makes me delay and try to get a judgment as soon as possible."

"The plan provides," Mr. Kieckham explained, "for the extension of the present railway wharf — and would provide room for a railway spur line that will enable smaller vessels to load at the wharf. At the present time we are unable to accommodate the smaller vessels because of the fact that in the heavy shipping season, which is in the fall and early spring, the large warehouse accommodates the larger vessels to be loaded for Bermuda and southern United States points. We are unable to accommodate the smaller boats loading for Newfoundland, St. Pierre-Miquelon and the Magdalen Islands.

"If the Department approves of that project and the railway wharf at Souris which we all believe is necessary, it would be a fine thing for the county of King's. Unless we have that wharf extended, it will be difficult for us to accommodate the shipping that would otherwise use the port of Souris."

Mr. Kieckham added that it is also necessary to have the Queen's wharf and the Government railway there repaired in order to accommodate shipping.

Mr. Fournier replied that the Souris project was "quite a big plan," and when asked directly if he had approved it, told the King's member that "we are considering it right now."

Mr. Kieckham then urged further dredging service for King's in view of the shallow water in many of the harbors.
