Potato Bulletin

"In our last bulletin (July 29) we reported that traces of late blight had been found in a few fields in Prince Edward Island and in the North Mountain area of the Annapolis Valley," states the Science Service Laboratory bulletin. "Since then the weather has been characterized by showers in most regions. If dull, wet weather sets in, we could be faced with another blight year. Growers should maintain the spray schedule in order to protect the plants from possible early destruction by the disease. Particular attention should be given to late planted fields where early death of the foliage would result in low yields."

Illustration Field Day At Long River Yesterday

Strongly advising the greater use of silos and grass silage, Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, expressed in detail the many advantages of this type of storage and feeding before a crowd of more than 500 at the Illustration Stations field day in Long River yesterday at the farm of W. E. Johnstone and Son.

The Minister also explained the Bonus Policy of the Department regarding livestock and the veterinary service available.

Mrs. R. C. Parent spoke of her recent visit to Great Britain and France where, she said, Canadians are in good favor. "The kindness and hospitality of the British people was unbounded and their cheerfulness and determination under economic restrictions is amazing," she said.

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture discussed the marketing of farm products and said that more efficient farming methods should be employed and that conservation was of paramount importance. Small scale farmers were urged to co-operate with each other more fully in the use of expensive machinery.

Mr. Shaw spoke at some length regarding marketing problems and intimated that there might be some difficulty in marketing this year's crop of potatoes in view of the fact that there was an increased acreage in both Canada and the United States.

The Field Day was conducted under the supervision of Mr. W. N. Black, Agronomist, Illustration Stations who spoke in glowing terms of the highly satisfactory work being done on the Johnstone operated station. All side hills have been put to the production of pasture herbage, and 108 plots are devoted to the study of fertilizing formulas.

A tour of the station fields, pastures, meadows, root and potato crop areas followed the addressed session and the activities concluded with a full course chicken supper attractively served and much enjoyed.

Copper Comes Back To London Free Market

LONDON (AP)—Copper came back on the London free market Wednesday for the first time in 14 years.

Closing quotations on the London metal exchange was 215 pounds to 217 1-2 pounds a ton spot—a big drop from the 252 pounds which ruled until Tuesday under government control.

The quotations of 215 pounds to 217 1-2 pounds were the equivalent of 26.87 to 27.20 cents a pound. At 252 pounds a ton, the price was about 31.50 cents a pound.

In the U. S., domestic copper is available at between 28.50 and 30 cents a pound.

The three months price was 200 pounds to 202 1-2 pounds. Turnover was 2,250 tons.

The government took over all dealings in non-ferrous metals in 1939 at the start of the Second World War. Tin was handed back to the free market in 1949, lead in 1952 and zinc in January this year.

In May, the government announced it was shedding its copper trading and since then the trade had been idling to await the expected lower price in the free market.

Authoritative sources say the government now holds a record 240,000 tons of copper stocks. The government announced last week it will release copper from these stocks as necessary to keep the free market full.

The government now controls only two non-ferrous metals—tungsten and magnesium.

Ontario Gold Production Down

TORONTO, (CP)—Production of Ontario gold mines in the first half of this year was valued at \$42,219,965, compared with \$43,399,859 in the first half of last year. Thirty-five mines contributed to this year's figure, compared with 42 mines last year.

Other figures, with comparative figures from last year in brackets, included:

Tons of ore milled 4,866,285 5-178,945; ounces of gold 1,215,765 1,228,720; ounces of silver 192,145 203,243.

June figures from 35 mines, with the preceding June in brackets, included:

Tons of ore milled 782,404 822,835; ounces of gold 188,368 200,722; ounces of silver 30,234 35,504; value \$6,614,827 6,992,890.

Toronto Police Officer Charged With Manslaughter

TORONTO, (CP)—Police Constable Earl Snider was charged with manslaughter Wednesday in connection with the death of Gordon Hurst, 19, killed Tuesday night by the second of two "warning shots" fired by Snider.

The youth was hit as he attempted to scale a fence behind a residence to which police had been called to investigate prowlers. An older companion escaped.

Chief Constable John Chisholm ordered Snider removed from patrol duties, although he has not suspended the officer. Snider was remanded for a week on \$8,000 bail.

Snider is reported to have surprised two shopbreakers on the roof of a warehouse and shot and wounded Charles Williams, 36, in the head.

Snider is reported to have told his superiors that the shots were only intended as warning shots.
