DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

PROHIBITION.

What It Will Lead To.

OTTAWA, May 28. Before the Committee of Privileges and Elections, yesterday, Robert McGreevy read a number of private letters sent him by his brother Thomas McGreevy. They amount to nothing. In the House of Commons yesterday a large amount of private business was done, and the Senate passed the Modus Vivendi Bill. The prohibition debate has been postponed until Wednesday next. A deputation of ministers and other temper-ance men waited on Hon. Messrs. Bowell and Foster yesterday, supporting the Prohibition motion before Parliament. Mr. Foster replied at length saying that the will of the people when ascertained would be carried out. But, he said, seven and a half millions loss of revenue must be supplied by direct taxation, as it was useless to talk of raising the amount by customs taxation.

Complimentary to Sir Charles.

LONDON, May 28. At the banquet given Sir Charles Tupper last night, an appropriate acknowl-edgment of the services rendered by him to the Imperial cause during the Canadian elections was made.

The New Orleans Matter.

WASHINGTON, May 28. Advice from Rome state the Italian premier has had an important interview with the United States' Minister Porter, and the New Orleans question has now assumed a new phase.

Movements of the Fish.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau.)

HALIFAX, May 26.—Herring are reported very plentiful to-day at Perce, but continue to be scarce at all the other stations in Quebec as well as on the shores of northern New Brunswick and P. E. I. The catch was fair at Port Hood, C. B., but scarcely any were taken at any other point on the Cape Breton coast, and the only report of any taken in Nova Scotia was a fair haul at Port La Tour. The haul of lobsters was very good to-day at Perce (Que.), and at Point Escuminac, N. B., so many are being taken, that it is reported that some factories will have to stop fishing to clear what is already on hand. The fishery continues good also on the north coast of P. E. I. On the Cape Breton coast, the catch was good at Port Hood and fair at Arichat; in Nova Scotia fair at Spry Bay and Ports Latour and very good at Pubnico and Digby. Mackerel are abundant at Pubnico, and Johns Island, N. S., and a few very fine ones were taken to-day, at Digby. United States seiners in port at Liverpool, report not one school seen yet. The herring fishery at the Magdalen Islands is reported a failure and many bankers are compelled to leave there without being bated.

Died and buried at sea, on April 18th, on the voyage from Buenos Ayres to Barbadoes, Henry James Pippet, only son of Sarah R. and the late John J. Pippet, formerly of Charlottetown.

A PROSPEROUS CONCERN.—The annual meeting of the Amherst Boot and Shoe Company was held at that place on Tues-day. The directors report showed a splendid year's business. The year's sales were \$350,000; the number of employes on the pay list 200, and the wages amounted to \$45,000. The best of feeling prevails between officers and employes. With one or two exceptions all the employes are Canadians. The principal markets are in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island.
