NEW YORK (AP)—There are two good reasons why Tommy Davis will be trying extra hard for base hits during this final week of the 1963 baseball season.

Plans for Los Angeles Dodgers pinch the National League pennant and he can move past Cincinnati's Frank Robinson to win the circuit's batting championship.

Davis and Robinson are tied for the batting lead at 343. The Dodgers outfielder gained three points in last week's games by collecting 11 hits in 36 tries. Robinson climbed two points with nine safeties in 22 attempts.

Davis virtually has sewed up the runs batted in title. He drove in eight runs last week, giving him 147 for the campaign. Robinson and San Francisco's Willie Mays are deadlocked for second place with 134.

College Role Of Church Forecast For Decline

CALGARY (CP)—A Roman Catholic educationist Saturday

forecast a decline in the role of the church will have in university education.

Rev. E.J. Roche, registrar of St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, told the Canadian Catholic Association that the church's resources aren't great enough to give children the education they need.

In referring to the Deutch Commission on education in New Brunswick, he predicted that its implementation would reduce the number of Roman Catholic sponsored universities in the Maritimes in the next 10 years.

Father Roche said he would hesitate to start a new university because of the large amount of money that would be needed to hire a first-class faculty and build facilities.

He said there are many conflicting theories of education in Canada, even within universities, and pointed to the University of British Columbia as an example, where Dean Neville Scarfe of the university's faculty of education and Dean S.N.F. Chant of the faculty of graduate studies had opposing views on educational philosophies. Father Roche said that under such conditions parents might get the idea that their children are subjects of experimentation.
