THE INVENTION AN ENGLISHMAN OFFERS TO SCULLERS OF THE FUTURE.

The London correspondent of the Herald writes:—A certain Thomas Jones Edwards, described as of the borough of Southwark, London, has just patented a contrivance which he fondly hopes will entirely revolutionize the art of sculling. This ingenious gentleman points out that it is a manifest inconvenience for scullers to sit with their backs to the bows of their boats, inasmuch as they cannot very well see the direction in which they are progressing. This is a self-evident proposition, because oarsmen have not eyes in the back of their heads, while, in hardly contested events, they do not usually find much time to gaze round. So Mr. Edwards has invented a curious something, which he says gives the oarsman infinitely greater leverage on his sculls, and drives the boat canoe fashion. Moreover, the manipulator wears a complicated arrangement of slings and braces, extending across his back and over his shoulders 'guys,' if such a term can be applied, being secured to the handles of the sculls. Thus he is enabled to throw the weight of his body into the stroke, and the inventor declares that infinitely increased momentum is acquired. I cannot describe how the sculls are rigged beyond saying that each is affixed by a swivel to the rowlock of the opposite side of the boat to that in which the blade catches the water. There is one of these contrivances now at Putney, and its designer is anxiously looking round for a man bold enough to suffer himself to be trussed up and to go afloat. Some of these days I suppose the necessary victim will be forthcoming, and then I shall go to see the fun, or tragedy, whichever may be the result. Perhaps in a few weeks I shall be able to master the intricacies of the invention, and then I may say more about it. At present I scarcely feel warranted in calling upon American and Canadian oarsmen to tremble lest they lose their supremacy.

A Sheep in a Shirt.
