CROPS IN THE WEST.—Some Manitoba and Northwest farmers who do not expect large crops this year, says the Winnipeg Free Press, can, at least, have the consolation of knowing that their brother farmers south of the Canadian line are in a much worse condition. The Dakota crops are especially hard hit. Manitoba elevators for men expect to handle fully as much wheat as last year. In some sections of the Canadian Northwest, however, the crop is a failure.

THE ORINOCO ARRIVES.—The steamship Orinoco, with a large party of excursionists on board, arrived here last evening about nine o'clock, and is lying at Pownall wharf. After the steamer had been made fast last night she was boarded by a number of our citizens who were entertained to a most enjoyable programme of vocal and instrumental music. The steamer is handsomely furnished and the saloons are spacious and comfortable. It is pleasing to have to say that the visitors speak the language of attention they have received, and we are asked on behalf of the party to thank all who have in any way contributed to their enjoyment. The steamer will leave here at 3 p. m. today for Dalhousie, the Saguenay, Tadoussac and Quebec.

"SWEET MARIE."—A New Nessel Launched Amid Great Enthusiasm—Chaperoned by One of Boston's Fair Daughters.

MARIE, Aug. 9.—Long before the specified time Dingwell's field was overrun by a vast and interested audience, gathered to witness the launching of the future record breaker. All the youth, beauty and fashion of the surrounding country were out in full force, many of the costumes being marvels of the modiste's skill. At the appointed time amid loud cheers and the waving of handkerchiefs, the boat glided gracefully from the ways into the expectant arms of St. Peter's Bay.

The christening bottle was broken at the right moment by Miss Jeannette Smith, one of the belles among Marie's summer visitors. So, with many good wishes the "Sweet Marie" began her career, and we hope that it will be a successful one.

SPECTACLES.—Of late years reports have reached the different departments of the presence of United States whalers in Hudson Bay waters, and of the great havoc which is being done among the fur-bearing animals and to the fisheries in that region. Now information is to hand that away at the mouth of the Mackenzie river seven American whalers wintered there and are conducting active operations this summer. The day cannot be far distant when the Dominion government will have to assert its authority in these unauthorized territories. Inspector Connelley of the Mounted Police has been sent up to Yukon county for the purpose of investigation and report in reference to the alleged smuggling.

In spite of the increased speed of modern travel, sea-sickness becomes more prevalent year by year. A return issued by the British Board of Trade shows that the total number of sea casualties which occurred to ships sailing under the British flag in 1892-3 was 6,317; the total number of losses at sea was 630, and the tonnage 215,661. Both as regards vessels and tonnage this is lower than any previous year in the returns. The loss of life was 1,901, as against 2,392 the previous sixteen years. The advance is chiefly due to improved construction and stricter regulations as to the loading and manning of ships sailing under the British flag; but part of it may also be set down to better charts, improved lighthouse arrangements, and greater precautions for the saving of life in case of shipwreck.

NEWS NOTES.

There are now 800 men at work in the Pullman shops.

A wealthy prospector named Isaac Roy was murdered and robbed near Edmonton, N. W. T., on Sunday.

The Canadian Government will at once advertise in English papers for proposals to lay and maintain a submarine cable across the Pacific ocean.

The Chinese government has specially thanked Germany for the action of the German warship Elbe in rescuing 150 Chinese who were struggling in the water after the sinking of the transport Kew Shung.

In two or three years at most Toronto will have a greater mileage of asphalt pavements than either London or Paris. The former city has 21 miles, a plan and the latter 26 miles. In Toronto there are now 18.2 miles of asphalt, and this total will be somewhat increased before the end of the year.

The United States have at last found an excellent use for the new navy. The Atlanta rammed a derelict dangerous to navigation of Boston on Friday last and cut it in two, sending it to the bottom. The warship struck the wreck amidships, with no hurt to herself. This feat may result in the revival of negotiations for a convention between the United States and Great Britain under which the Atlantic squadrons of both countries would join in ridding the North Atlantic of floating wrecks dangerous to navigation.

The Northwest is not the only wheat-growing district agitated by the burning question of railway rates. A deputation recently waited upon the Premier and Minister of Railways of Victoria, asking for a reduction of 30 per cent. in the freight rates on all agricultural produce. The farmers were said to be in dire distress, and all their woe were at the door of the Government, which charged such high railway rates. Unfortunately one member of the deputation gave the thing away by admitting that the farmers could not produce wheat at a profit if they had free transportation. He said the cost of production at Wimmera was 2s 6d and the price at Melbourne 2s 2d.

It is well known that women attain an extraordinary age more often than men. One of the most celebrated centenarians was the Countess De-mond, who lived 143 years, and died in the reign of James I. as the result of an accident. This extraordinary woman was at the age of 100 years so active and lively that she used to take part in the dances with young people. At the age of 145 she travelled from Bristol to London, on a small undertaking in three days. Even this instance, however, is surpassed by the case of a French woman named Marie Prior, who died at St. Colombe at the age of 155 years.

An extraordinary London Gazette has been issued containing a proclamation by the Queen of England's neutrality in the war between China and Japan. There is also published in the Gazette a letter from the Earl of Kimberley, the Foreign Secretary, to the Lords of the Admiralty setting forth the rules to be observed at the various British ports and harbors. A belligerent man-of-war must leave British waters within twenty-four hours after its arrival therein, unless the master or the necessity of taking in coal or provisions prevents. In the event of a Chinese and a Japanese vessel being in a British port together, an interval of twenty-four hours must elapse between the departure of the two vessels.

The Czar has had a good many unpleasantness of late. Among a number of documents awaiting his signature, which had been placed on his table, he found a sentence of death against the Emperor of all the Russias, to be carried out in twenty-four hours. It was stamped by "The Society for the Liberation of the Russias," and it was impossible to discover how it had found a place on the Czar's table. A few days later the Czar found a skull in one of the bedrooms, on the front fence of which was written, "Alexander." Gen. Tchererin, who is in charge of the palace, recently dismissed all the Emperor's servants and replaced them by old soldiers. He has also made a thorough examination of the palace and grounds, with a view of discovering any secret passages that may exist there.

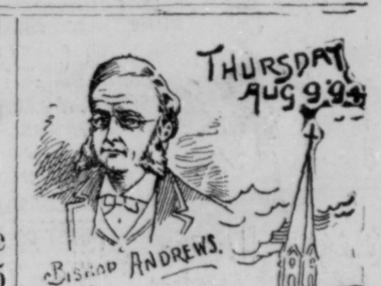
