**The Basuto War.**

A despatch has just been received at London, from Cape Town, stating that the Basutos have just won a great victory over the Colonial troops. They have seized the town of Heidelberg, and the situation is regarded as most critical. The colonial authorities have asked to have troops immediately forwarded from England. The news from South Africa has caused excitement that almost in intensity amounts to consternation on the part of the Government. In Conservative circles, it is sarcastically said there is evidently a secret understanding between Basutos and the Land League, the former having undertaken to produce a diversion in favor of Parnell and his compatriots.—The chances of re-taking Heidelberg are slight until troops arrive from England. There is no doubt that English influence in the Transvaal is greatly shaken by this event.
