## British Tories Gaining In Poll

LONDON (CP)—Prime Minister Wilson, riding high on the election trail, received a sting Thursday where it could hurt—in the marginals.

A public opinion poll reported that Edward Heath's Tories appeared to be making a modest comeback against the Labor party's massive lead in key marginal constituencies in London and the southeast area.

The March 31 general election must be decided in the marginals in London and elsewhere—hence any trend in those ridings is anxiously analysed by politicians.

Wilson, following a major speech in Manchester Saturday, returns to London to conduct daily press conferences next week, with speaking forays into the countryside. Heath and his big guns also will be concentrating on the London district where the greater number of marginal ridings are located.

The national opinion poll, in a special report on marginals, said that for the second consecutive week Tories were at least making inroads into the lead Labor held at the start of the campaign.

But with election day only a week away, the big questions were whether the indication of a Tory recovery was coming too late and whether it can be sustained through the campaign.

## Civil Service Tables Report

There were 1,306 classified positions in the province's civil service as of Dec. 31, 1965. According to the annual report of the civil service commission, tabled in the Legislature Wednesday, 128 of those positions were vacant and the number of classified civil servants at work at the end of the year numbered 708 male and 562 female.

The department of health had the greatest number of positions with 496. Welfare and Labor had 201 positions; Highways, 181; Education, 153; Public Works, 64, and Agriculture, 60. The Liquor Control Commission has 48 classified positions.

Other positions range from 49 in the offices of the Provincial Secretary to three in the Public Utilities Commission.
