A GOOD SUGGESTION.

Sir,—I see that one of our churches has announced its intention of raising funds to help the poor Armenians. Would it not be well for all to do so? There should be no hesitation about moving in this matter. Think of the man who fell among thieves. Let us not pass the Armenians by on the other side. Let the pastors of each church announce a collection next Sabbath in aid of the Armenians, and our conscience will feel better of it.

NOT A CHRISTIAN LEFT.

Some of the Terrible Scenes at the Latest Massacre of Armenians. LONDON, March 2.—A correspondent at Constantinople sends the following regarding the massacre at Brizik. The town had 1,000 Christian inhabitants and 9,000 Mussulman population. After the massacre at Quera on the 28th of October, the authorities at Brizik compelled the Armenians to surrender their arms to the government. Then troops were called out by the government to protect the people. The people were compelled to furnish horses, beef, food and carpets for the soldiers, and finally they were reduced to a state bordering on destitution. The end came on the 1st of January with the news of the massacre of several thousands of Christians at Quera by the soldiers. This incited the troops at Brizik to imitate this crime. The assault on the Christian houses began at nine in the morning, and continued until midnight. After plundering the houses the soldiers made a systematic search for men to kill. The cruelty used to force men to become soldiers were terrible. In one case the soldiers found twenty people, men, women and children asleep. They shot them and killed all the men and boys because they would not become Moslems. After cutting down one old man they put five coals on his body, and as he lay writhing in torture they held a bible before him and taunted him. Others were thrown into the river while still alive. Christian girls were eagerly sought after. Ninety-six men are known to be killed. The others have become Moslems to save their lives. So that to day there is not a single Christian left in Brizik. The Armenian church has been turned into a mosque and the Protestant church into a seminary.

LATEST NEWS NOTES

Wesley Vauvart, Q. C., has been elected Mayor of Fredericton by acclamation. A serious outbreak of yellow fever has occurred in Rio Janeiro. Of the creeps the Italian warship Lombarda, numbering 230 men, 225 have been attacked by the disease, and 84 have died. The Hovests says Russia will maintain the independence of Korea, and if Japan continues intriguing Russia may be forced to occupy the peninsula. Japan must consider that if she wishes to acquire Korea this means war with Russia. Charles W. Mason, of New Haven, Vt., has shipped from New York, 50 fine wool American merino sheep to South Africa for his trade in that country, where they bring a big price in gold. Sheep of this variety and Vermont Morgan stallions find ready sale for breeding purposes. Late advices from Seattle state that a disastrous land and snow slide has occurred on the Great Northern Railway in the Cascade Mountains, rocks, trees and earth have been swept down the mountain side, carrying away snowsheds, bridging and tracks. There has been a complete blockade of the road since last Monday night.

SPAIN PREPARING.

Spain Ship Owners Will Come to the Rescue in Case of War. MADRID, March 2.—The cable dispatches which are being received here from the United States are increasing the feeling of indignation which was aroused among the masses when it became known that the United States Senate favored the recognition of the Cuban insurgents as belligerents and the newspapers here confirm reports that the Spanish naval squadron, consisting of four cruisers and a dispatch boat, is to be sent to Cuba without delay. In addition, Spanish officers naval and marine are to be attached to the Spanish mail boats, which are to be armed and equipped as auxiliary cruisers. The greatest activity is being displayed in the government dockyards, and every preparation is being made by the naval and military forces for the most serious eventualities. The impartial today declares that the utterance of the United States Senate consists in an "unqualified and unreasonable provocation," and adds: "If the desire for war was in response to a fault committed by Spain the senators would be accomplishing their duty, but no provocation has been given to the United States, and the Americans judge rashly of the results of a Spanish-American war. The distasteful language of the senators ought not to surprise any one. United States senators are accustomed to exchange gross insults without crossing swords or exchanging balls. These are the cowards who are seeking war, and one awaits death with more coolness with a conscience than with pockets filled with dollars." In conclusion, the impartial counsels the Spaniards to reserve their strength and "emergencies for an opportune moment." El Liberal says it is impossible to compare the recognition of secessionists with the Cubans, and in explaining this assertion remarks: "Then America warmly congratulated Spain as a noble and honest friend. Can we do the same to the senate and President Cleveland?" It was announced here this evening that a number of Italian ship owners have offered, in the event of war, to provide Spain with steamships to be used as privateers. A number of students during the afternoon assembled in front of the university with the intention of making a demonstration against the United States, as a result of the senator's action in regard to Cuba, and the American minister at Madrid, Fuchs, was the target of their anger. The students led by the authorities got wind of the affair and a strong force of police was turned out. All the streets leading to the legation were blocked and the students, who were rioting, would have been severely punished. WASHINGTON, March 2.—Senator De Lome today in an interview with an Evening Star reporter said: "If the Spanish government should take any action with reference to the stand that congress has taken it would in all probability be communicated to this government through the medium of Cassin J. Taylor, the American minister at Madrid. Further, more, he is on the spot and is able to speak knowingly of the situation in Spain, while I, over here, am but little better in a position to form a just estimate than you are yourself." "The rebellion in Cuba, would never have been a serious matter at all had it not been for the interference of the United States." "I never would have passed the limits of a mere riot had it not been for the money, supplies, arms and men that were sent from this country. Men have gone from this country with the assurance that the United States would extend to them the rights to the Cubans, and would in all probability send a fleet to Cuban waters to support the insurgents. At no time have the students in this country given the situation in Cuba a fair investigation to ascertain what the facts actually are. It has been said that all Cubans are actively interested in the rebellion, but the truth is that the vast majority are not. Cuban generals and several hundred Cuban officers fighting in the Spanish army in Cuba. In fact, I am sure there are more Cuban officers in the Spanish army than there are white leaders among the insurgents." PARIS, March 2.—The Temps believes: "It will help the government to suppress the rebellion in awakening Spanish patriotism. The new nation will never permit a stranger to intervene." La France says: "We owe our sympathy and help to Spain in defence of her rights against the covetous Americans." PASADENA, March 2.—The new bill of adoption of resolutions acknowledging the belligerence of Cubans by the United States congress meets with the approval of all classes of citizens here. The news has been received with enthusiasm. It is believed Central and South American republics will be quick to follow the example of the United States. BAZEL, March 2.—The North German Gazette, commenting upon the demonstration in Barcelona yesterday, says that Spain's indignation and excitement are quite natural and correct. Nobody in the meantime to reverse may see upon the reported increased armament of Spain as tragic. Still, if President Cleveland should follow up the Senate's request and recognize the Cuban rebels as belligerents before the negotiations between Washington and Madrid are ended, then the negotiations ought to be terminated. The Frankfurter Zeitung asserts that secret negotiations are pending between France and Spain, with the object, on the part of Spain, of procuring the intervention of France against the United States. The Vossische Zeitung expresses doubt whether the wisest and most honest opinion in the United States will enable Mr. Cleveland and his government to resist the powerful jingo pressure, combined with the influential clique interested in sugar and tobacco. The Beacon Courier says: The United States government is driving toward a conflict with Spain. This and other agitators give proof that the American isolationists are no longer so safe as they were. The warlike tendencies which are supposed to be possessed chiefly by countries requiring compulsory and universal military duty. The Reichsdeutscher declares that no Spanish government can give up Cuba. The United States senate, the paper thinks, has made a gross attack upon Spain which will create a most serious conflict unless the American government tries to avoid going to extremes. WANG AND CHANG TURNED OUT.

The Emperor of China Gets Rid of Two High Officials. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 2.—Advices from Tokio, Japan, to February 11th say: The Emperor of China recently cashiered and dismissed from the public service Wang, vice-president of the board of civil appointments, and Chang, vice-president of the board of revenue. Last year, according to some authorities, when Peking was in terror of Japanese attack; in tribute it said to have been set on foot to destroy the revenues of the empire, and perhaps, to divide the court against itself. Other historians of current events allege that no intrigue existed, but that many loyal servants of the crown, indignant at the abject humiliation suffered by the country in consequence of the total breakdown of the military and naval defenses, organized and controlled by the emperor dowager's nominees—notably the Viceroy Li—were unable to confine their expressions of anger within prudent limits. Whether intrigues of patriots, Wang and Chang used some very strong language at an audience with the emperor, no notice was taken of their words at the time, but nine months afterward the emperor issued a decree, in which they were sentenced as above detailed. It is reported that Chang has become broken-hearted, and that Wang has become a suicidal maniac. The Peking minister of war has resolved to establish in different parts of the city schools, in each of which 500 lads will receive military training under foreign officers and graduates of the Tien Tsin military academy. For the moment an exceptional calm reigns over the generally troubled sea of Korean politics. The cabinet seems to be firmly set. It is a progressive cabinet, friendly to Japan. Moreover, there are no indications of Russian intrigue or interference.
