By telephone from Summerside to-day we learn that in the Civic elections there yesterday, Richard Hunt, Esq., was elected Chairman by a majority of 26 votes, and the following were elected Councillors: H. A. Compton, Arthur C. Rogers, Ronald Campbell, A. McKay, Wm. P. Baker, Philip R. Baker.

BUSINESS was fairly lively at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning. The docket consisted of five Scott Act cases and three drunks. Of the Scott Act cases one was dismissed, three were disposed of for \$30 each, and the defendant in the remaining one was ordered to be imprisoned for two months. The drunks were fined \$4 each.

THE five-mile bicycle race for the championship of the Island, takes place in the Roller Rink to-morrow evening. The rink will be open at 8 o'clock and one of the military bands will furnish music for the occasion. There will also be several running races and Mr. James McEachern, champion of the Maritime Provinces, will give an exhibition of pole vaulting.

THE Department of Marine has presented to first officer Brown, of the American steamer Morgan City, a valuable binocular glass in recognition of his humane services in rescuing the crew of the brig Arthur, of Charlottetown P. E. I., which was wrecked about 25 miles S. E. of Tortugas Light Station, on the coast of Florida. The steamer who assisted Brown were forwarded \$10 each.

MR. ROLAND MELLISH, General Agent of the British American Book and Tract Society, Halifax, is on his annual visit to the Island. This Society was instituted nineteen years ago. Within that time there have been 148 colporteurs employed, whose services equal the services of one man for 208 years. They travelled 367,128 miles, and made 562,174 visits to families, distributing books, &c., to the value of \$220,086.95, of which amount \$15,767.23 were distributed free of charge. Besides this there have been \$218,148.05 worth put in circulation direct from the depository, making a grand total of \$438,235.50.

A PHOTO correspondent telegraphs that an effort is being made by the liberals in Pictou and Colchester to get L. H. Davies, of P. E. Island, to make political addresses in these parts soon. The correspondent says it is thought Davies will take the stump against McLean in Colchester. Mr. Davies is a reckless politician but we think he will hardly bother Mr. McLean. In fact we do not think any person is likely to bother Mr. McLean, whose big majority in February is sure to be increased.—Moncton Times. Mr. Davies preached Free Trade for P. E. Island at the late Federal election. Perhaps he will boom secession for Nova Scotia now, or probably explain Leader Laurier's position on the Commercial Union question.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The French Minister's Proposal. PARIS, Oct. 3. The Temps says that M. Flournois, the French Minister of Foreign Affairs, recently proposed to Lord Salisbury, the British Foreign Secretary, that an international commission on the Suez Canal be appointed to determine the limits within which the construction of fortifications and the assembling of troops shall be forbidden. Lord Salisbury has not yet replied to the proposition, and it is believed that he is unwilling to accede to it.

A Presbyterian Conference. TORONTO, Oct. 3. A large and important conference of Presbyterian ministers and office bearers was held this afternoon in the Central Presbyterian Church, at which the evangelistic work of the Church in Canada was considered. A large number was present from all parts of the province. All the speakers favored increased activity in evangelistic work, and overtures on the subject will likely be made before the next general assembly.

A Recent Collision. TORONTO, Oct. 3. The inquest on the body of Thomas Campbell, who was drowned in the Bay through the collision of the ferry boats, Sadie and Gertrude, Sept. 13th, was concluded to-night. The result was a verdict that the collision was caused through the negligence of Capt. Martin, of the Sadie, and a warrant has been issued for his arrest.

The President's Movements. ST. LOUIS, Oct. 3. The President and party visited the State Fair to-day and were cheered by 40,000 people.

LATER. He addressed the Merchants Exchange and held a reception from 3 to 6.

Statements Denied. DUBLIN, Oct. 3. Gibson, the Irish Solicitor General, denies the statement of Wm. O'Brien, that the former on the day of O'Brien's conviction at Mitchelstown, telegraphed the Crown Counsel that the Government would lose the case and disbar Harrington. The Crown Counsel denies that he received any such telegram.

Sir Charles Tupper's Movements. OTTAWA, Oct. 3. It is understood that Sir Charles Tupper is now on his way to Canada. He will call at St. John's, Nfld., and interview the Governor regarding the coming fishery convention, as well as incidentally discuss the prospects of the admission of the island into the Dominion.

League Meetings Held. DUBLIN, Oct. 3. A score of meetings were publicly held in different parts of Ireland yesterday by the National League. The police in most cases were baffled in their attempts to ascertain where the meetings were to be held.

Bennett's New Venture. PARIS, Oct. 3. James Gordon Bennett will publish a newspaper in Paris, to be known as the European Herald. It will be modelled after the New York Herald.

The Delayed Steamers. QUEBEC, Oct. 3. The steamers which have been delayed for a week by the fog and smoke between here and Montreal arrived to-day and proceeded to sea.

Hon. Mr. White's Appointment. OTTAWA, Oct. 3. Hon. Mr. White has been appointed superintendent of general Indian affairs.
