

# Forest Fire Prevention Drive Paid Off This Year

 Concerted forest fire prevention campaigns held throughout Canada during the year have paid off, forestry officials say.

Human carelessness has been replaced as a top fire hazard by lightning, at present an uncontrollable factor. A Canadian Press survey showed almost 5,000 forest fires were reported in Canada this year, almost one-half in British Columbia.

Officials have been able to cope with the human angle by publicity, but they are at a loss with the lightning problem. Manitoba reported 89 of 210 forest fires were started by lightning while Ontario said a conservative estimate would be around 525 of its 876 fires were similarly caused. But even so Ontario's fires were cut by two-thirds this year.

In the United States Project Skyfire has been undertaken in an effort to discover whether lightning can be controlled and perhaps reduce forest fires in that way.

Reports on the project say water-bombing from helicopters and planes was used this year more than in any previous year. Chemicals are being used on some fires but the old-fashioned pick and shovel have not been forgotten, either.

British Columbia's 2,592 forest fires reported this year led all of the provinces by far. The provinces reported figures below the 1,000 mark.

Alberta's forests are in good condition after a rainy summer. Fires in Manitoba have been sporadic as the southern section was wet and the northern extremely dry.

In Ontario 876 fires were reported, against last year's total of 2,252, quite a fall-off, but the acreage burned amounted to 292,788 this year against 396,423 last year. The acreage burned was cut drastically to 26,617 this year from 300,000 acres last year. Hull reported the most serious fire, as flames consumed 10,000 acres of woodland.

Last year 500,000 acres were lost and for the last 25 years the average amount burned has been 200,000 acres a year. Officials said a wet summer has caused the drop.

Last year \$2,000,000 was spent on forest fire fighting, but no figures were available this year.

New Brunswick's summer of rain and no extended dry spells had 98 fires, which burned 1,177 acres. Last year four of 164 fires accounted for 87 per cent of the 12,787 acres burned.

Neighboring Nova Scotia said the woods are in good condition after a summer of rain and what few fires there were were all minor.

Last year 234 fires burned 11,636 acres with one destroying 80 buildings and 14 fishing boats before being controlled.

The worst fire in two decades in Nova Scotia saw 44,929 acres go up in the smoke of 444 fires in Prince Edward Island has no woodland of consequence.
