EXPLANATION.

Look for the Dominical Letter for the Year, and underneath it stands the Day of the Week, which all the Figures in the Table shew to be such Days of the Month under which they stand. In short, whatever Day stands under the Dominical Letter, all the Figures in the Table will be the same Day of the Week in each Month under which they stand respectively. But it must be observed that in Leap Year there are two Dominical Letters, the first of which serves for January and February only, and the other to the year's End.

In the present Year, 1793, being the first after Leap Year, F is the Dominical Letter, under which stands Monday; which shews that all the Dates in the Table are Mondays for the Year 1793.

To find the Dominical or Sunday Letter, according to the Calendar, until the Year 1799 inclusive, add to the Year of our Lord its fourth Part, omitting Fractions, and also the Number 1: Divide the Sum by 7; and if there is no Remainder, then A is the Sunday Letter: But if any Number remaineth, then the Letter standing under that Number at the Top of the above Table, is the Sunday Letter.

NOTE. To find whether it be Leap Year or not, divide the Year of our Lord by 4; if Nothing remains, it is Leap Year, if 1 remains, it is one Year after—if 2, it is two Years after—if 3, three Years after.

For the next Century, that is, from the Year 1800 till the Year 1899 inclusive, add to the current Year only its fourth Part, and then divide by 7, and proceed as in the Rule for finding the Dominical Letter above.
