

Allie Carver Scores 3 Goals To Pace 5-3 Win

The Parkdale Flyers, with Allie Carver in his usual role of showing the way, out scored the B. Y. C. 4 goals to 2 in a lightning fast and bloody third period, to take home a 5-3 victory over the Y. C. club and sole possession of first place in the Island Senior B League at the Spors Arena last night.

The score was deconstructed 1-1 after two periods of well played, exciting hockey, when Carver finally shook his shadow and took personal charge of proceedings whipping home 3 of the 4 Parkdale goals.

In the first two periods both teams threw up a very tight defense around their goalkeepers but at that both Gehrke in the B. Y. C. nets and Roper for Parkdale were called on to make some sensational stops. Roper in particular was brilliant turning aside 21

The B. Y. C. started the scoring at 15:45 of the first period when Jack Ready, moved up for the moment to a forward position, was on the pay-off of a neat passing play with linemates Mousie Weatherbie and Bill Wilson.

Less than a minute later Parkdale tied it up with Junior MacLeod potting a wild one from the side of the youth club cage. Allie Carver set up the play when his shot was deflected wide and picked up by MacLeod.

There was no further scoring until 2:48 of the third period when Junior MacLeod, playing a stellar game for Parkdale, sent coach Carver away over the B. Y. C. blue-line. Carver cut in from the right side of the defense and his knee-high shot beat Gehrke clean!

Carver was back at 6:08 giving the Flyers a 3-1 lead when he scored a goal while lying flat on the ice after being knocked down by a youth club defenseman.

Kitchener-Waterloo Drubs Czechs 10-1 For Second Win

PRAGUE (CP)—Billy Colvin's three goals led Kitchener-Waterloo to a 10-1 victory over Czechoslovakia's B team Thursday night as the Dutchmen swept their three-game pre-Olympic exhibition series.

The Canadians, who leave by air today for Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy where the Olympics begin next Thursday, defeated the same Czech team Thursday night and Patsiey Pirates 6-5 in Scotland Monday.

Buddy Horne and Paul Knox with two goals apiece and Don Roper, Bob White and George Scholes with singles completed the scoring as the Dutchmen took a 4-1 lead in the opening period, added five more in the second and then coasted home with the only goal of the final frame.

LAUFMAN HURT

Josef Sella scored the lone Czech goal in the penalty-free game.

Centre Ken Laufman collided with Czech defenseman Jan Lidral late in the third period and suffered a mild concussion. He was taken to hospital overnight for observation but team officials said he would be ready to leave with the team today.

The 15,000-odd spectators who packed Prague's open-air stadium were so impressed with the Dutchmen's play that besides giving the usual form of applause — hand-clapping — in the final period they roared "let's go" every time a Canadian player grabbed the puck.

SKATES THROUGH TEAM

Horne scored the game's most spectacular goal midway in the first period when he took a pass from Butch Martin at centre ice and stuckhanded his way through the entire Czech team.

The Czechs pulled goalie Josef Zahorsky, star player in Wednesday's game, at the beginning of the final period. He was replaced by Jaroslav Bartos but by this time the Dutchmen had begun to ease up.

"I think we have shown we can play top-flight hockey in the European style," said coach Bobby Bauer after the game. "I am proud of the boys but we fully realize we will meet stiff competition at Cortina."

Czech Newspapers Hail Canada's Olympic Squad

PRAGUE (CP)—Czech newspapers hailed the Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen, Canada's Olympic hockey representatives, Thursday, as "well balanced, collective... without stars or prima donnas."

All praise the teamwork, speed, clean play and adaptability of the Canadians.

Many sports editors drew comparisons between the Dutchmen and Penitents Vs, who played two exhibition matches here last year before going to Germany to win the world hockey championship for Canada.

The general comment is that although the Dutchmen had no individual stars to match Penitents' colorful Warwick brothers, perfect teamwork was their strongest suit. One newspaper says the Dutchmen were "obviously holding something in the reserve for Cortina."

The Czech word for "collective" in effect means "single unit" or "team" with emphasis on co-operation.

Czechoslovakian Sport, official publication of the state sports committee, says:

"Canada's decision to send a real collective to the Olympic Games is interesting and shows they correctly appreciate the strength of their chief opponent."

"The Canadians' concentration on the game and position play was exemplary."
