

Local and Other Items.

No mails crossing to this side to-day. The Ontario Legislature was prorogued on the 1st inst. Remember the Carnival at the Rink to-night in aid of the poor. The Salvation Army has commenced a campaign at Kingston, Ont. One Montreal hotel is said to have taken \$88,000 during carnival week. Dr. McIntyre, M. P., King's County, left to-day for Ottawa, via the Capes. Three cases of drunkenness at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. Rev. Robert Tweedy, Methodist Minister of Hampton, N. B., died on the 21st ult. Rev. Father Osborne intends holding a mission for children in St. Peter's Church. The Bishop of Honolulu, Sandwich Islands, arrived at Halifax from England this week. The Mount Allison College Gymnasium was destroyed by fire on the 29th ult. Loss \$400. See the way to spell valentines, in the Diamond Bookstore windows, 89 Queen Street. Ten millions of Canadian Pacific Railway stock has been placed on the Montreal stock market. Sixty disabled locomotives are being repaired at Winnipeg, as the result of the recent cold spell. A large number of ladies and gentlemen from Summerside will appear in costume at the Carnival to-night. An extended notice of the new Diamond Bookstore, Queen Street, unavoidably crowded out, will appear on Monday. Prof. Easty is in town; and intends to make arrangements for a course of entertainments here in March next. Robert Boyner, of New York, now owns \$32,000 worth of fine horses. Thirty years ago he was working for \$10 a week. Advertisements from the Northwest state that the ranchmen about the Bow River district have lost large numbers of cattle, owing to the severity of the weather. The Chronicle telegraphist says it is rumored that Senator DeBou, heretofore will be appointed Speaker of the Senate. Mr. DeB. was formerly Premier of the Conservative Government of Quebec. John Sutherland, brother of the member for Selkirk, Man., died at Winnipeg on the 20th ult., of exposure. He was last six days while on the way to Fort Francis and Winnipeg, and went three days without food. The deposits in the Post Office Savings Bank from July 1st to December 30th, 1882, were \$4,095,006 for the corresponding period of the previous year they were \$2,942,850, an increase of \$1,152,156. An alarming report is current at Winnipeg that the Indian Chief, Maikatawashee, failing to obtain food by hunting in the White Beaver Lake district, North of Selkirk has eaten his wife and family of seven persons. On the 30th ult., at Halifax, two or three of those old buildings to the north of the old Masonic Hall (that well known and venerable landmark in our sister city) were destroyed by fire and gutted. This was an eyesore for many years. J. H. Fletcher, Esq., lectured in Summerside on Thursday evening on "Common Sense." A correspondent informs us that the lecture was excellent, and drew the largest audience of any since the appearance of Rev. T. DeWitt Talmage, of Brooklyn. A terrible wind storm visited Denver, Col., on the 29th. A dozen or more buildings were demolished, while the roofs, of many more were torn off and in some instances carried 50 feet. Several persons were seriously, though none fatally, injured. MONTEZUMA HILLS.—Notice is given that application will be made to the Legislature at its next sitting for an amendment to the act incorporating the Montezuma Light and Water Company to extend their powers so as to enable them to use and sell electricity for lighting purposes. The Cotton Company will also make application for power to borrow money on debentures of Company or other security.—Times. SOME American base ballists of the coming season are receiving fabulous prices. The New York Club are paying some of their players such large figures as follow:—Connor gets \$2,200; Gillespie, \$1,700; Welsh, \$2,000; and Ewing, \$1,200; while John Ward, the Providence pitcher, last season, gets the largest salary of any ball player in America—\$3,700, or over \$600 a month. This is said to be the largest salary paid to a player in the United States, the aggregate being \$25,000. THE BELLIVEAU ALBERTITE AND OIL COMPANY.—This Company's brief report shows that Albertite has been found in small quantities in the shaft which is being sunk; also that considerable quantities of oil have been met with. Mr. McQuat and other mining engineers speak encouragingly of the prospect of finding both Albertite and oil at greater depths. Mr. George Botsford, of Fredericton signs the report, and is prepared to correspond with parties interested in testing the mine.—Moncton Times. THE Minister of Customs recently decided the following seizure cases which have been long pending here. The thread seized for being entered under the name of McMaster, McClurg & Co., Toronto, has been returned to the firm paying duty on the extra value placed on the goods by the appraisers. It appeared to the department that no fraud was intended, and therefore no fine was imposed. Messrs. Lord & Munro, flour importers, were fined \$1,000, and called on to pay \$2,000 duty on the flour which they imported for shipment, and then substituted Canadian flour in its stead, thus saving fifty cents per barrel duty. WILLIAM HERRILL, of North River, was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon, and fined \$1 and costs, for assault. Herrill, yesterday, took a WEEKLY EXAMINER from a newsboy named McIsaac, and refused to pay for it. A policeman who saw the contemptible transaction arrested Herrill. At the trial this morning Herrill produced witnesses who swore that he did not take the paper; but the officer testified that he saw the prisoner take the paper out of his pocket and throw it on the street previous to arrest. On this evidence he was convicted, and the fine was rightfully imposed.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Crossing at the Capes. CAPE TORMENTINE, Feb. 3. Six boats carrying L. H. Davies and wife, Senator Haythorne, A. C. McDonald, F. De St. C. Brecken, Mr. Jas. Dover, Alex. Strang and wife, Officers Coffin and Schaffler, with two prisoners all under charge of Capt. Irving and Muttart arrived at Cape Tormentine at 1 p. m., after a splendid passage. The ice is in first rate order. Weather cold but calm. At the board ice, three cheers were given by the passengers for the efficient and careful contractors under whose superintendence such a comfortable passage had been made. The passengers expect to reach Amherst in time for the night train. Bishop McIntyre and Rev. Dr. McDonald are here waiting to cross. Terrific Gales on the English Coast—Two Vessels and All Hands Lost. LONDON, Feb. 3. Terrific gales continue to rage on the English coast. Yesterday two unknown ships were wrecked off the Isle of Man, and all hands on board both vessels perished. Ontario Elections. OTTAWA, Feb. 3. The Ontario Local Elections will take place on the 27th inst. The French Pretenders. PARIS, Feb. 3. After a stormy session of the Chamber of Deputies, M. Faber's Bill proscribing pretenders to the throne of France and giving discretionary power to the authorities to expell them from France, passed on division—343, appearing for the Bill and 163 against it. President Grevy has expressed the hope of soon getting a chance to dissolve the Chamber. Twenty-three Women Killed During a Panic. LONDON, Feb. 3. A despatch from Bombay says during a panic in a Woolen Mill, twenty-three women were killed, and many more seriously injured. The Revolution in Ecuador. NEW YORK, Feb. 3. The Revolution in Ecuador is now complete. The Dictator has been driven to his last stronghold. Latest Telegraphic Notes. The Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh have started for St. Petersburg. It is announced that a congress of astronomical savans from all European countries will be held at Strasburg in September. British sentries at all the Egyptian palaces have been removed, and Egyptian soldiers have undertaken the duty of guarding them. It appears that the vessel sunk off Mumbles Head on the 29th ult., was not the steamer "Black Watch" as first supposed, but another steamer of similar tonnage and carrying about the same crew. As a means for the prevention of collisions at sea, Siemens Brothers & Co., of Berlin, recommend the use on steamers of a fog light with revolving parabolic mirror, with power a thousand times greater than that of a lantern. On the 31st ult., an avalanche, 3 miles from Crested Beetle, Colorado, carried away the works of the Howard & Smith Anthracite Coal Mines, also a building containing 38 employees. After several hours work the men were dug out, but Philip Carming, Logan, Immau, Louis, Richards, Wm. Moore, Charles Betts, J. J. Raymond, another, name unknown, were dead. A locomotive was also swept from the track yesterday in the same vicinity, and buried under 20 feet of snow. Weather Bulletin. Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the Maritime Provinces. Valparaiso, Nov. 24—The Malinche, which sailed Nov. 17 for Falmouth, had again received the discharged portion of her cargo. The total expenses amount to \$13,750. In port Dec 15—barque Geo. Peake, McDonald, for New York. Boston, Jan. 31—The British steamer Melita arrived here to-day from Newcastle, England, reports 24th January, off Banks of Newfoundland, bearing East 200 miles, fell in with wreck of British schooner J. H. Smith, having been exposed to terrific gales, could be done condition. As nothing further could be done to save the property, she was abandoned by the officers and crew, and all taken on the steamer and brought to this port. The schooner was bound from Demerara to St. John's N. B., with molasses. New York, Jan. 31—The steamer Broomfield, which arrived to day from Swansea, reports Jan. 17, lat. 31.10, long. 18.50, passed a disabled steamer, schooner rigged, with a red funnel, and had a list to starboard. London, Jan. 30—The British brig Aubrey Peake, from Rotterdam, has been passing sixty miles W. S. W. of Solly Islands making signals to Districts.

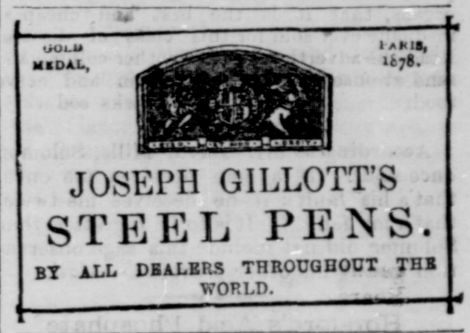
