OTTAWA — Government plans for the construction of a new Army in Charlottetown are the subject of a question paper by the commons' order paper by Health Macquarrie, member of parliament for Queens.

He is seeking information as to whether a suitable site has been obtained for the erection of a post office at Hunter River and, if so, when it is intended to commence construction.

And he wants to know when a start will be made on construction of the bridge across Rustico Harbour to allow completion of the Gulf Shore Highway in the Prince Edward Island National Park.

to shorten campaigns and smaller Commons committees with less staff.

Minority governments should not consider every vote in the House as a vote of confidence that could bring them down. More give and take between the government and the opposition was needed in law-making to make Parliament more effective.

PROMISE NOT FULFILLED
Heath Macquarrie (PC-Queens) said he was disappointed that the government has failed to act so far on its promise to join the Organization of American States.

He warned against a proliferation of government agencies and civil servants. "Bureaucracy is the means of government. It must never become the government itself. The experts should be on tap, but never on top."

He also warned that the Prince Edward Island causeway linking the island with the rest of Canada is a "great project which has been already decided upon and on which there has been a pledge and a commitment."

A. B. Patterson (SC-Fraser Valley) said the decision to accept recommendations of the International North Pacific Fisheries Commission should have been first to a Commons committee. He had received many critical comments from constituents.

Lloyd R. Cruise (PC-Queens-Lunenburg) said the government should encourage private investment through tax reforms and trade with the Caribbean through tariff concessions.

He asked what would happen to many Liberal campaign promises left in the throne speech. He mentioned university scholarships, equalization payments to poorer provinces, a distinctive flag and several other promises.

Adult Education Centre Aim of ARDA Directors' Brief

Directors of the federal-provincial agricultural rehabilitation and development program for Eastern Canada will hear a brief Tuesday afternoon which will ask for assistance under the ARDA program to set up an adult education centre in the Maritime Provinces.

The brief, prepared by the Maritime section of the Canadian Association for Adult Education, will be presented by Thomas Jones, assistant director of adult education for Nova Scotia during a meeting at Montgomery Hall.

ARDA directors will be in Charlottetown for several days next week, attending a workshop in community development, designed for fieldmen of various provincial government departments.

Provincial research director Hartwell Daley said this morning that establishment of an adult centre is under consideration as a project for 1967, Canada's Centennial year.
