More Road Deaths Than All Last Year, Is Report

"I am very much disturbed by the number of impaired driving cases in P.E.I.—I haven't checked the figures but it seem to be on the increase" said Premier A.W. Matheson yesterday afternoon as he addressed the Maritime Chief Constable two-day convention being held at Civic Auditorium Summerside. Premier Matheson, who also holds the portfolio of Attorney-General, said impaired driving is a very serious problem. He stated that already this year there have been more deaths in the Province than all last year, although many of these are not attributable to alcohol. "The Premier, who was thanked by past president Joseph Oakes, was preceded by three distinguished speakers, Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, Judge W.E. Darby and Lt. Col E.H. Strong, Q.C., M.C. Mr. Strong who was introduced by Summerside Police Chief Peter R. White, said he felt he should address the Chief Constables not only as guardians of the law, but also as guarantors of the people. He stressed the helplessness of the public without police protection but said he had never seen a monument erected to those who served in the police forces of our country, and he asked, "what reward do these men receive?" in answer he said, often only monumental criticism. He concluded saying "I take great pleasure in saluting you and the constables that serve

Dr. MacKinnon Hopeful Of Atlantic Provinces' Future

"It is time that we exported our sons and daughters at home" said Dr. Frank MacKinnon, in an address last evening to the Maritime Association of Chiefs of Police. He noted that the Atlantic Provinces were remembered in some places as a fish eating area which exported its sons and daughters.

Dr. MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College, and president of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, said that unity, which was necessary in the Atlantic Provinces, was developed by conventions such as the one attended by the police chiefs. He said too many people think of the Atlantic area as the "have not" provinces, and that "have not" provinces, and that it was gratifying to see its citizens taking a number of actions to dispel this negative idea.

He admitted that it was not always easy to run business and political affairs here, but pointed out that despite their relative small sizes, Nova Scotia had almost led the world in the development of democracy in the early days of this nation, and that Prince Edward Island had full constitutional government when it had only 300 settlers.

Dr. MacKinnon recalled that in his school days Alberta and Saskatchewan were then the poor provinces of Canada. But the people had taken a second look at the area, and he suggested that a second look was also being taken at the Atlantic area.

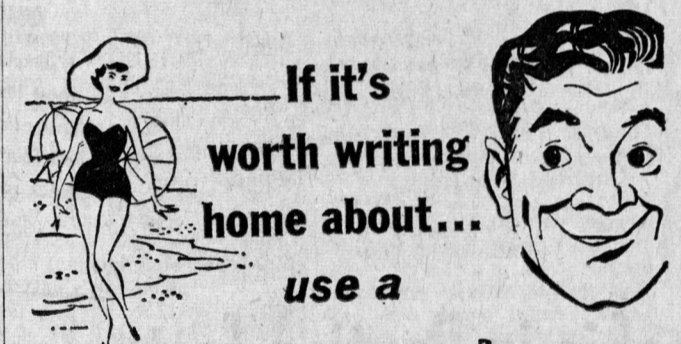

Trio Escape In Truck-Scow Accident On Port Hill Wharf

Mr. William Newcombe of Northam, accompanied by two young men from Lennox Island, escaped uninjured when Mr. Newcombe's two-ton truck almost ended up in the water at the end of the Port Hill wharf in an accident which occurred when the vehicle was being driven on a scow which was to have taken it to Lennox Island with a load of grocery and food supplies.

The accident occurred late yesterday afternoon, and is believed to have resulted from the breaking of a mooring line which held the scow against the wharf while the truck was being driven along a ramp and aboard the scow. When the line broke, the craft is reported to have floated out from under the ramp, causing the truck to fall forward at a precarious angle and causing damage to the front part of the vehicle, and resulting a narrow escape from plunging head first into the water, with the three occupants in the cab.

Efforts were being made to get the truck hauled back onto the wharf, and it is reported that all the merchandise was saved.
