

A convention of the Maritime Region (No. 12) of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Canada was held at Dartmouth, N.S., on June 25 with president John H. Morris of Charlottetown presiding. There were 68 delegates in attendance. As the business session for this convention was held at a spring conference in Amherst at an earlier date, the program consisted of Committee reports, Council reports and the election of officers for the ensuing year.

In his annual report, president John Morris stated that over 100 new members joined the ranks in units during the past year. The training program was increased during the year and the overall spirit is a good sign for the future of the Maritime Region. The president remarked that a more members should be the aim rather than the extension of new units.

Due to many failures in the past with the loss of seven units before 1954; more training and more members must be instituted in all units. Twelve recommendations were put forth by the president with at least eight accepted by the new Council. One particular recommendation was the need for membership in the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council.

The election of officers was the highlight of the Conference and in line with the statement of the outgoing president that new zeal and enthusiasm was evident, the election was the closest contest ever staged in the Maritime Region.

Newly elected president Frank Keiver of Moncton won over the other candidate by one vote, while two of the five vice-presidents were also elected by a one vote margin. The election lasted 2 1/2 hours, the longest on record. Replacing Ignatius MacDonald of Charlottetown as Regional Vice-President for P.E.I. was James Cudmore of the Montague Junior Board of Trade.

Before adjourning the afternoon session, National President Monty Aldous spoke on the success of J.C.C. in the nation and expressed his desire to see a larger membership in Junior Chamber International.

Potato Bulletin

Colorado potato beetles are now laying eggs on the foliage in early planted fields, states Bulletin No. 2. These eggs will hatch in a few days into the familiar red larvae. Flea beetles are also now causing considerable damage to young plants by puncturing numerous small holes in the leaves. DDT, either as a dust or spray, is effective in controlling both these pests.

Expect Large Attendance At Credit Unions Meeting

The annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League gets under way at noon today with a luncheon at the Charlottetown Hotel. The guest speaker on this occasion will be Mr. Gurden P. Farr, president of the CUNA Mutual Insurance Society.

Mr. Farr is a past president of Credit Union National Association, treasurer of the Detroit Postal Employees' Credit Union and President of the Service and Savings Loan Association. In addition to these positions, Mr. Farr is employed with the Public Relations Department of the U.S. Post Office.

Upwards of eighty delegates representing forty credit unions throughout the Province are expected to attend. These delegates represent some 10,000 members in Prince Edward Island.

The first Credit Union to be incorporated in Prince Edward Island was in 1936. Ten years later there were 52 Credit Unions operating with assets amounting to \$600,000; this year there are 58 Credit Unions with assets of \$1,250,000.

This tells the story of people who through their own efforts have devised a savings and credit service which has been able to make loans to the amount of \$6,250,000 of which only .05 per cent has been considered uncollectible.

Credit Union members have their own insurance company CUNA Mutual Insurance Society. There have been numerous instances where families of deceased members have benefited from the plan. For example in a recent tragic death in the Western part of the Province last year the families of four men benefited to the extent that their loans were paid off and their savings covered dollars to have more sense." "The debt dies with the debtor" are two slogans which have been well maintained by 19,000 Credit Unions throughout North America with a membership of 10,000,000.

ed a total number of patients as 1,228, and a total number of patient days as 9,305.

Mrs. Leroy White presented the report for the Ladies Auxiliary. Approximately \$1,000 was raised. Besides contributing to the hospital campaign, the auxiliary has provided a sewing machine, robes, clock for operating room, new gowns for doctors, redecorated the deluxe room, and provided curtains, pictures and drapes and also Christmas treats for patients and staff.

Mrs. A. C. MacKay gave the report for the Beaver Club which showed total receipts of \$5,249.54, and expenditures of \$4,666.90 which included donations to the hospital and nurses residence of \$2,674.75.

The report of the Nurses Club was presented by Mrs. Roland Diamond. Receipts, \$231.50; expenditures \$195.16, which included a donation to the hospital campaign and items for the hospital nursery - crib sheets, nighties, baby binders, aprons, throw sheets and operating room sheets.

Dr. Preston MacIntyre and Mr. T. M. Llewellyn were reappointed trustees. Mr. Robert Murray was reappointed auditor.

A petition from the registered nursing staff of the hospital was read and discussed, and tabled for further consideration. A vote of thanks was extended to the Ladies Auxiliary, the Beaver Club, the Nursery Club and the matron and staff of the hospital.

Some discussion also took place regarding fire protection in the hospital, and the removal of patients in the event of fire. It was suggested that the Fire Marshal and other authorities be asked to consider the instituting of measures for sufficient protection. The meeting then adjourned.

FOUR POINT PROGRAMS

He outlined a four point program for the improvement of conditions in the Atlantic Region as follows: 1. Greater citizenship

EDUCATIONAL SESSION

The educational session was presided over by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of Prince of Wales College. Dr. MacKinnon stated that an economic history of the Atlantic Provinces, especially Prince Edward Island, was needed and he thought that the link up with the Maritime universities in the Maritimes should supply this information through extensive research work.

The work of the Canadian Association for Adult Education was described by Dr. J. R. Kidd, Director of the Association.

The summary at the end of the conference was made by Dr. F. W. Walsh, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Nova Scotia. He stated that a lot had been learned at the conference and the adult educators should be prepared to go out in a missionary manner and do their work.

RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed: "We commend the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council for setting up a committee to study the power question and that we recommend this committee provide to adult education groups within the Provinces information on the subject of power so that groups can carefully examine the questions involved and report back to APEC on their findings."

4. That plans of the Atlantic Regional Council, C.A.A.E., over the past two years to secure and publish authoritative material for citizenship groups should now be linked up with the efforts of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council.
