the province and would require considerable investigation by the transportation committee later in the session.

Another topic which he said must be debated was that of matching grants. Attorney-General Alban Farmer replied that there would be a statement on the matter.

BYELECTION WINS
Mr. Matheson took issue with a recent statement by Premier Walter R. Shaw who said, following Liberal wins in the Feb. 9 byelections, that byelections usually go against the government in power. The opposition leader produced statistics which he said showed that Premier Shaw's statement was not correct. "The records show the opposite of what the premier maintains," he said.

Commenting that P.E.I. has been referred in national publications as "the most surveyed province in Canada", the opposition leader listed a number of recent surveys which had been conducted in the province.

He said it was "only fair and just" that copies of surveys be given to members of the Legislature at the same time they are given to the press, so that members could have time to study the reports and "discuss them intelligently."

Surveys he mentioned included reports on Irish moss, peat moss, instant mashed potatoes, overall development, resources and fisheries, industry and tourism, education (Lazerte) and that of the Royal Commission on Higher education.

DISTURBED
Stating that it was his intention to present to the people "a picture of what is going on in the province, and adding that if the picture was favorable to the government, "I will not hesitate to say so." Mr. Matheson said he was "considerably disturbed about the financial picture."

He referred to the two and one-half million dollar budget deficit of last year, and said he agreed with the premier that "deficit financing for industrial development and a balanced economy is perfectly justified," but did not agree with the way it was done, as he said money for industrial expansion in the province did not come from the deficit.

Three Appear On Store Breaks

A full docket faced Magistrate James B. Johnston in Kings County Magistrate's court yesterday morning in Georgetown.

Gerald Archibald MacLean, Murray River, appeared on a charge of possession of an offensive weapon and making a false statement for application under the liquor permit act. The case was adjourned by mutual consent and re-scheduled to March 24 for preliminary hearing before judge and jury. Accused was represented by John P. Nicholson.

Preston Allison MacSwain, charged with failure to yield the right of way, had his case adjourned to March 10.
