THE RUSSIAN WAR.

A Peaceful Outlook.

England's Proposals Probably Accepted.

Guarding the Dardanelles.

LONDON, May 1. Russian agents are trying to buy coal at Newcastle. There is a lull in the war excitement, pending the receipt of Russia's reply to Earl Granville's despatch. That the Russians are advancing on Herat is denied. The Standard favors a declaration of war, and says any settlement now with Russia would only shelve the matter for a short time. The Standard laments that Gladstone should at this hour propose any plan of settlement. Advice from Herat state that the people would rather suffer the hardships of a long siege than surrender to Russia. There is a slight relaxation in the tension of the relations of Russia and England. Russia appears disposed to entertain England's proposal to submit matters to arbitration.

VARUNDA, May 1. A British iron-clad is steaming to and fro through the Dardanelles to prevent the sinking of torpedoes.

PARIS, May 1. It is stated that Russia has made counter-proposals to England, and that these proposals will be accepted by England.

LONDON, May 1. The Amer has been gazetted Knight of the Grand Commander of the Order of the Star of India. The Amer has sent troops to occupy Andoben Pass, to prevent a Russian surprise of Herat by that route.

LATEST. LONDON, May 2. The News says a special messenger has left St. Petersburg, and will arrive in London on Monday or Tuesday, bringing Russia's answer, probably an acceptance of the English proposal. The News intimates to England that he earnestly desires peace. The News rejoices that the prospects of peace between England and Russia are brighter than at any time during the negotiations.

THE RIEL REBELLION!

Hurrying to the Front.

Rebels Determined to Fight.

A Terrible Battle Expected.

WINNIPEG, May 1. The latest news from the North-west is that General Middleton is hurrying his troops towards the rebels, and a severe engagement may be looked for within the next few days, as the rebels will undoubtedly show fight again. The report that the rebels are short of ammunition is not credited. The residents of Battleford have returned to their houses. The result of the visit of the redskins was seen in the wrecks of furniture, houses, sheds and stolen provisions. Some few houses were burned by the Indians.

A Ghastly Discovery. PITTSBURG PA, May, 1. At the Union Depot to-day, the body of a murdered man was found packed in a trunk. He was probably 30 years of age. The police are looking into the matter.

Ordered to Sea. HALIFAX, N. S. May 1. The war ship Tenedos, now here has been ordered to get ready for sea.
