Describes Recent Trip To And From Australia

A graphic description of his trip from this Province to Australia was given to Legion members last night at the regular monthly meeting by Comrade Leo Bradley who recently returned from Tasmania. Accompanied by his wife he had been visiting their daughter who is married to a former Australian serviceman.

Mr. and Mrs. Bradley left here early in September of last year and sailed from Montreal on board the Ascania for Great Britain. During a 10-day stay in London he met many friends he had known during the days of the First World War.

They left England through Tilbury on the S. S. Otranto, a 21,000 ton ship of the Orient line. En route they crossed the Bay of Biscay and anchored briefly off Gibraltar.

Through Suez Canal
They sailed down the Mediterranean and stopped for a short time at Naples, Italy, where the food shortage was acute. At Port Said the natives were alarmed when a troop of Boy Scouts returning from a jamboree in Austria went ashore with their hats on. They became excited as they thought the "Kiwis" (wartime nickname for Australian soldiers) had returned.
