**S'Side Tests Snow Blower**

Snow banks that tied up traffic a few days ago are disappearing from Summerside streets where a snow blower is being tested by the town.

This machine, a full sized Seward Snow Master, originally costing \$21,000.00, was operated for only 6,000 miles by the Department of Transport, on a one-runway air port at Yarmouth, N. S., before being declared surplus.

A demonstration of its mechanical and operational condition was arranged for Summerside by Town Manager Joe Brophy, and, with approval of the Town Council, this snow-blower can be purchased by Summerside at a cost of only \$3,800.

This machine is a larger unit than the new Seward blower recently purchased by Charlottetown at a cost of \$16,500.

Powered by a 150 horsepower Buda gasoline engine, the machine, now at Summerside is equipped with chains and spare tire.

Summerside's Mayor W. A. Currie and members of the Town Council have all seen the machine in action.

Starting work before 9 p. m. Sunday evening, the blower worked throughout the night until 8 p. m. yesterday, resumed work again at 1 p. m., and was still working busily late last night.

**S'Side Will Not Receive Letter Delivery Service**

Regarding the resolution passed at a recent meeting of the Summerside Branch of the Canadian Legion B.E.S.L. in support of the establishment of a letter carrier delivery service in Summerside, a letter from the Post Master General was read at the regular monthly meeting of the Branch last night which said: "Field Officers of this department recently completed a detailed survey of Summerside in this connection. In addition to Summerside itself, the village of St. Eleanors and Slemmon Park were included in this survey. The total number of calls to be surveyed in all three communities, at the present time, would be 2,334.

If it were possible to include both St. Eleanors and Slemmon Park in with Summerside for consideration of letter carrier service, the total number of calls would approach the minimum of 2500 which has been set by the Treasury Board as a prerequisite for the establishment of letter carrier service. However, while the Village of St. Eleanors is contiguous to Summerside and forms part of one compact well built up area, there is a distance of 1.7 miles between St. Eleanors and Slemmon Park. Our report indicates that here are only four points

of call in this intervening territory. "Consequently, because of this considerable expanse of sparsely settled territory and the lack of public transportation in this area, Slemmon Park could not form part of Summerside from the standpoint of letter carrier service. This would leave some 2,079 points of call in Summerside and St. Eleanors.

"As this number of calls is still substantially short of the minimum figure of 2,500 required for the establishment of letter carrier delivery, it is regretted that no further action can be taken toward mail delivery service at the present time."

The meeting was presided over by the president, Ben Champion, and was attended by over 100 members of the branch. President Ben Champion and Past President, Dr. Hubert MacNeil were appointed as delegates to the Dominion Convention of the Canadian Legion which will be held at Edmonton, Alberta, May 25th to May 30th. It was announced that the Regional Zone Rally for East Prince will be held at the Summerside Branch on Tuesday February 25th with Alyn Arsenault as Chairman.

**Glydon Willis Heads East Prince Young Liberals**

Mr. Glydon Willis, Kensington was elected president of the East Prince Young Liberal Association at a reorganizational meeting held last evening in the Summerlea Restaurant, attended by 125 young Liberals and presided over by Mr. Charles Linkletter, president of the provincial association.

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C., who was introduced by Mr. Neil MacLeod, secretary of the East Prince Liberal Association addressed the enthusiastic gathering. He denounced the Diefenbaker Government on several counts. He stated that "we are fighting an election during the winter months of February and March and the blame must rest entirely on the shoulders of Mr. Diefenbaker." Mr. MacNaught said the Diefenbaker Government got the best co-operation for their legislative program of any government in recent years, but nevertheless he called an election when the unemployment situation is very serious, a time he stated, when there is no government to deal with emergencies.

He spoke of the unprecedented action of Mr. Diefenbaker in making a political speech after dissolution of parliament, when none of the leaders of the other

parties could reply. The guest speaker referred to what he called the most important planks in the Liberal platform. These, he said, are the magnificent scholarship program and the reduction in taxation announced by Mr. Lester Pearson a short time ago. Mr. MacNaught blamed the Diefenbaker Government for causing confusion and uncertainty, lack of national accounting and unwarranted statements about trade.

He was thanked by the newly elected president, Mr. Willis. Dr. A. R. Grant, president of the East Prince Liberal Association also addressed the meeting briefly, and was introduced by Mr. Linkletter. Other officers elected to the organization were: vice-president Armand Arsenault, Egmont Bay; secretary - treasurer, Donald MacDonald Summerside. Directors: 3rd dist. Lorraine Arsenault, Egmont Bay; 4th, Wilfred Trainor, Kinkora and 5th, Lowell Huestis, Summerside. Also seated at the head table and introduced by Mr. Linkletter were Mrs. William Smallman, president of the East Prince Women's Liberal Association, Mrs. (Dr.) Grant and Mrs. Charles Linkletter.
