GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, June 17. The telegraph operators decided that if the officials suspend any of them for refusing to work over time on and after the 27th the whole staff will strike.

The Times says it is apparent that the Ministry feel no uneasiness about the prospects of the land bill, so far as its passage through the House of Commons is concerned.

The Times' Dublin despatch says the desire to emigrate continues. The South Dublin Guardians resolved to send away thirty seven able-bodied paupers who desired to emigrate to America.

Sir Edward Watkin, chairman of the South Eastern Railway Co., has informed a meeting of that company that two experimental shafts for the proposed channel tunnel have been sunk on the English side and two on the French side.

Postmaster General Fawcett announced in the Commons, to-day, that a scheme would shortly be promulgated which would greatly ameliorate the condition of post office employees.

The House of Commons to-day, went into committee on the land bill. Clause 2 was carried without a division. Mr. Gladstone announced that he intended to move amendments to the third clause making it clear that a landlord is entitled to the same access to a court as a tenant and limiting the second sub-section to future tenancies.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 17. The measures instituted by the authorities at Kieff for the census of the Jews have induced a large exodus of those people.

PARIS, June 17.

The Chamber of Deputies has commenced a general discussion of the budget. M. Gaste commended the example of reducing the debt set by England and the United States, and M. Gauden recommended a reduction of land tax, in the interest of agriculture, which was hard pressed by American competition.

UNITED STATES.

BOSTON, June 17.

In the rowing regatta off Strawberry Hill, to-day, the professional single scull race of three miles, with a turn, was won by Hosmer, of Boston, in 22 min. 37 sec., beating Riley, Lee and Doyle of Boston. The amateur single-scull race, two miles with a turn, was won by Kirby, of the Narragansett Club, Providence, in 15m. 57s. Four crews contested in the race for four oared working boats.

The City Council met this forenoon, and after passing several bills, adjourned sine die.

NOVA SCOTIA CONFERENCE.—Rev. John Lathern has been appointed President of the Nova Scotia Methodist Conference. At the opening, Rev. R. Brecken was allowed leave of absence to visit England.

SIR JOHN MACDONALD still remains weak, but is able to take short walks. Dr. Clarke's diagnosis of his trouble is in direct variance with Sir John's Canadian physicians, and he therefore desires to be near his patient until he understands his constitution and until his health improves.

THE Fredericton Farmer states that "an important crisis has been reached in the appeal to the Privy Council from the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada regarding the Canada Temperance Act, as City Marshal Woodword was served with papers asking him to show cause why the decision of the Supreme Court should not be set aside."

WORK at the new breakwater at Point Du Chene commenced to-day. It will extend 600 feet in an easterly direction from the present one towards the shore. Only four or five men are employed at present, but when active operations begin a great number will be required. Some are now at work putting up a blacksmith shop and setting up a forge; also building a scow for carrying ballast, of which there are 3,000 yards lying on the flats ready for use.

WE regret to learn that the residence of Mr. J. G. Macleod, of Bothwell, together with his store, granary, warehouse and stable, was, on the night of the 16th inst., entirely destroyed by fire. The time of the fire was a little past midnight, and Mr. Macleod and family barely escaped with their lives. The work was that of an incendiary. Strong suspicion rests on a fiend in human shape who repeatedly threatened to commit the act; but his threats were too lightly heeded by the victim. Mr. Macleod has the entire sympathy of the whole community, as he is deservedly held in high esteem by all who know him. His loss will be great, as there was no insurance. Mr. Macleod is brother of Mr. M. G. Macleod, of the firm of J. D. Macleod & Co., of this city.

THE Sun contains a favorable criticism of some pictures Mr. Miles, an artist in St. John, has prepared for the Halifax Exhibition, and says:—
