

Parkdale And Primroses Dominate League Scoring

Parkdale's great centreman Orin Carver is threatening to make a runaway of the Island Hockey League scoring race and Parkdale and Montague players dominate the first nine positions in the scoring according to latest official figures.

Carver has pulled away in the last few weeks from all rivals with 18 goals and 11 assists. Eight games Carver is 11 points in front of his nearest competitor Billy Hughes of Montague. Hughes has 11 goals and 11 assists in seven games for 18 points.

Orin's brothers Skip and Allie are tied for the third slot with 17 points each. The Carver boys have identical records of 7 goals and 10 assists while Dowling has 8 goals and 9 assists.

THREE PRIMROSES

Arsenault has 8 goals and a like number of assists while Dick Carroll and defenseman Stu MacLure each have 5 goals and 11 assists. Parkdale's Jim MacLeod is next with 15 points.

First Summerside player to show in the standings is Coke Grady with 11 goals and 18 assists which is good for only 14 1/2 points in this league as Summerside goals and assists are worth only 1/2 point. Vance Harris and Lorne Hennessey, the other two members of Summerside's top forward line have 12 1/2 points each.

The Parkdale Flyers lost the league lead to Summerside Aces for one day but regained it again defeating Montague Tuesday night. The Flyers have an average of .625 which is 42 percent points higher than the Aces in second.

DEFENSE IMPORTANT

The statistics indicate that poor defensive work is the cause of Montague's last place standing in the loop with only 2 wins in 7 tries. Both of their wins were at the expense of Summerside Aces. While the Primroses have five players among the top eight scorers in the loop their goaltending average is the worst in the league.

On the other hand B.Y.C., with only one scorer, Merrill Pineau, in the top 20 scorers, are in third place and have an amazing goaltending average—for this league—of 3.50. This indicates that Thane Doyle and the youth club's solid defense is largely responsible for their third place standing.

Hornung Says Nothing Wrong With Spirit Of Notre Dame

NEW YORK (AP)—If there was anything wrong with the famed Notre Dame football spirit this year quarterback Paul Hornung couldn't detect it.

Hornung met the New York press Wednesday at a luncheon preceding the annual Heisman Trophy dinner at which he was to receive the award as the outstanding college football player this season.

He adroitly avoided a direct reply to former Notre Dame coach Frank Leahy, who recently criticized the Notre Dame team for lack of spirit and "letting down" the college by failing to show enough fight. But in response to questions he said:

"I don't think the Notre Dame spirit was dimmed a bit. Before every game we thought we had a good chance of winning. I don't think the Notre Dame spirit will ever die."

Tom Hugo Says East Team Had "Proper Attitude"

MONTREAL (CP)—Tom Hugo of the Montreal Alouettes said Wednesday members of the eastern star team "had the proper football attitude" when they took the field Saturday against the West in the Shrine game at Vancouver.

The Hawaiian-born centre was commenting on a report that half-back Don Pinney of Ottawa had considered dropping from the lineup because he felt most of the eastern players had looked upon the game as "an expenses-paid trip, and a good time in Vancouver."

"Most of us didn't think too highly about the way the affair was organized, but we woke up and decided to give it all we had because the game was for a worthy cause," said Hugo.

The West drubbed the East 35-0 in the game. The proceeds of the game go to crippled children's hospitals in Montreal and Winnipeg.

Seixas, 33, noticed the ailment during a workout and visited an Osteopath later.

Seixas and Herbie Flam, the retrieving wizard from Beverly Hills, Calif., are scheduled to be drawn today for Friday's opening singles matches against Ramana Kirshnan and Naresh Kumar of India.

Bill Talbert, U.S. captain, was not disturbed by the development and said he planned to name Seixas unless the pain worsened. If Vic is withdrawn, Sam Giamalva of Houston, Texas, will be substituted.

Galaxy Of Stars To Play IN Blue-Grey College Game

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (CP)—When 49 college seniors show their football abilities in the annual Blue-Grey game here Dec. 29 every position will have a man who made honorable mention on the Associated Press All-America list.

Of this group of 13 standout performers, eight will play for the Confederate Grey all-stars and five for the Yankees.

Despite the southern squad's numerical superiority among the country's best players, the most impressive record belongs to northern invader, quarterback Lenny Dawson of Purdue.

He has completed 243 of 452 passes roving 3,325 yards in three years of college participation.

Dawson is the first player to lead the big ten conference in both passing and rushing for three years in a row. His record this year was 69 pass completions in 130 attempts for 856 yards and seven touchdowns.

While the North appears to be concentrating on an aerial offense, the southern strength seems to come principally from a running game. Jack Pardee of Texas A. and M. is one of the South's best hopes with a season's record of 455 yards rushing in 95 attempts. Ronny Quillian of Tulane topped that with 625 yards in 156 carries
