REVIEWING CURRENT YEAR

Reviewing the government's current fiscal year, which ends March 31, Mr. Farmer said "we were able to carry out our entire program of providing an extensive expansion of governmental, economic and social services, even though we had to resort to deficit financing to the tune of \$2,897,470."

The forecast net debt of the province on March 31, 1964 will be \$30,195,723. Mr. Farmer said "Mr. Speaker, and honorable members, I wish to assure you that despite this debt, the province is in a very solvent position so much so that only recently we were able to sell a debenture issue at a cost to the province comparable to the richer provinces."

"Within 24 hours this issue was in entirety and the investing public seeking more of our bonds. It was a test that exactly what they call the tourist season. Also, that another bias of the white stuff could be seen to sink the whole lot and knobodie into the Atlantic."

PREPARED TO BORROW

Mr. Farmer said that the government is prepared to borrow to proceed with its proposed programs as outlined in the Budget Speech.

"At the same time," he said, "it is fully recognized that borrowing cannot go on forever, but must be considered only as a short-term means of financing policies which cannot be deferred pending a balanced budget. A deficit must be judged not for its magnitude, but for its purpose."

(Continued from page 1) credit totalling over \$6,000,000 that were not shown as liabilities, as well as naming orders-in-amount, involving millions of dollars, that were not included in the budget's picture of the debt position.

Mr. Matheson also read an item which showed that the province's crown building corporation had paid the firm of Bell and Foster \$4,000 to search 16 property titles. "Who is Foster?" he asked. "He is," he said, "the president of the provincial Conservative association. The government pays him well."

## City Court Has 8 Cases

The city police court docket which confronted Acting Magistrate Gerald R. Foster, C.J., yesterday was highlighted by six cases of persons being drunk and inebriate.

One man was unable to appear in court because of his condition and was remanded until this morning. Of the others, three were given a fine of \$10 and costs or five days and the others were fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.

Mr. Matheson also said debt charges in the province are an indication of how serious the financial situation is as far as liabilities are concerned. He pointed out that in 1952 debt charges were \$1,000,000 and by 1964 they had risen to \$3,599,000.

In conclusion, he said of the budget "Frankly, I'm worried. You can't go easy on a thing like this."

Mr. Matheson adjourned the budget debate and will have the floor when it resumes Monday. The Legislature will sit this morning at 10 a.m. to consider legislation.

DEBT CHARGES

The amount proposed for services to the public debt is \$3,280,457, made up of \$2,230,989 for interest; \$1,017,200 for debt retirement and \$22,168 for amortized debenture account.

Forecast deficits of other departments, with the increase over the current year's spending in brackets, is: attorney general, \$417,276 (\$82,184); agriculture, \$814,612 (\$16,267); industry and natural resources, \$580,607 (\$22,312); fisheries, \$149,463 (\$47,213); highways maintenance, \$2,535,353 (\$37,663); public works administration, \$167,065 (\$49,131); provincial secretary, \$237,217 (\$4,171); development, \$237,451 (\$7,351); provincial treasurer, \$247,128 (\$17,751); and municipal affairs, \$572,378 (\$9,230).

"Despite the increase in current expenditures," said Mr. Farmer, "the estimates, after providing for \$1,017,300 for debt retirement, still show a revenue surplus of \$208,634, to be applied against capital payments."

Ordinary revenue for the year is estimated to be \$26,186,555, made up of \$14,775,690 from the government of Canada, \$7,222,000 from taxes, \$2,383,040 from other sources and \$1,798,225 from licenses, permits and fees.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURES

The largest item in capital expenditures, estimated at \$5,475,000, calls for the highway, road and bridge construction, an increase of \$330,000 over the amount provided for the 1963-64 fiscal year.

The estimated expenditure in 1964 is \$1,500,000 for roads and resources projects; \$1,000,000 for Trans Canada Highway; \$1,300,000 for the provincial paving program; \$983,413 for highway construction, and \$220,000 for permanent improvements.

Mr. Farmer said "for institutions and other buildings, provincial parks, marine railways and other items of a fixed and movable nature, we have provided \$662,892.

"In addition, you will be called on to consider a further \$140,000 for rural electrification."

The capital and other receipts are estimated to be \$3,200,622. Sources of the capital receipts are: Government of Canada, \$1,816,200; other, \$156,500. Interest on sinking fund investments, \$500,822, and sinking fund appropriation included in budget charges, \$1,017,300.

Commenting on the budget proposals, both on ordinary and capital accounts, Mr. Farmer said "we deem them to be commensurate with the actual immediate needs of the province."

Mr. Farmer also informed the House that the government will be taking necessary action to introduce legislation at the present session authorizing the Lieutenant-Governor-in-council to raise from time to time such sums of money that may be deemed expedient for the purpose of paying any floating indebtedness or the covering of any debt of the province on open account.

"The bill will be for the purpose of funding \$1,000,000 unfunded debt for capital expenditures incurred for public works, highways and other payments

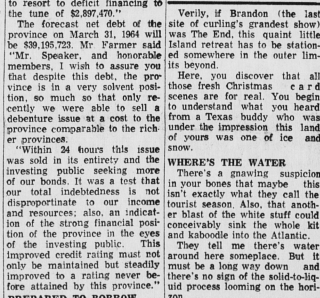
