Understanding Can Produce 'New Look' Confederation

TORONTO (CP)—Efforts by English and French-speaking Canadians to understand each other can bring about a "Confederation with a new look," Premier Lesage of Quebec said here.

He expressed the hope, speaking at a luncheon, that the understanding reached as soon as possible but it was of necessity a slow process and he would not set a time limit on it. He urged reporters after a speech here that by the Confederation's 25th anniversary year of 1967 "good progress" will have been made.

In his speech to an overflow crowd of 1,000 at a joint luncheon of the Empire and Canadian clubs, he gave his view of the future Confederation as a Canada where all the provinces would have more autonomy than at present, "each discharging fully its constitutional responsibilities."

"Assuming that all of the provinces did want this broadening of their administrative functions," he said, "some of them would be able to assume responsibilities that they consider themselves capable of assuming. In any event, it is upon this course that Quebec is set."

This United action by the provinces would not be preceded by co-ordination among them, he would be the free choice of each.

Premier Lesage called on English-speaking Canadians to assist the cause of Canadian unity by helping his province attain its objectives. "I will be forced to act alone, we shall be inclined to assume attitudes—and it will be a quite human tendency to do so—which will be less and less understood a day which would isolate us from the rest of the country."

Modern Quebec wanted to develop fully, not to be independent of the rest of Canada. Quebecers, except for a small minority, had no intention of leaving Confederation.

Discussing separatists with the reporters later, Mr. Lesage said it news media gave more importance to the positive actions taken by responsible people and less to the actions of a few extremists. "We could and would come more rapidly to the solutions that will keep Canada together and strong."

Negro Actor Gets Dramatic Lead Role

NEW YORK (AP)—Bill Cosby, one of the brightest of the new comedians, has been signed to co-star in an action-adventure series, I Spy, aimed at NBC's schedule next fall.

The show will mark the first time a Negro has had a lead role in a dramatic series.

Cosby, a studious-looking, gentle-mannered fellow who reserves his comedy routines for professional appearances, believes the assignment is important.

"Not as a racial issue," he said. "It's a personal quest. Can I do the job? Can this co-ordination turn into an actor's role? Can I play an agent disguised as a tennis bum? Cosby will be his colleague, disguised as his trainer."

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Ottawa May Use Flanker Ticker

OTTAWA (CP)—The National Research Council has developed machines that may help predict heart attacks and determine whether an unborn baby is alive or dead.

The council said here the machines will be shown publicly for the first time Thursday at the annual conference of engineering in medicine and biology at the Case Institute of Technology in Cleveland.

The machine that may help predict heart attacks is a new type of electrocardiograph which has proved successful on tests with animals. New tests have started using a dummy human with a tape recorder heart.

Dr. Graham Schuler, medical electronic engineer with the council's radio and electrical engineering division, said the electrocardiograph is virtually a television station in miniature.

The machines make it possible for the first time actually to see the damage caused to a living heart by a heart attack.

Some 4,000 annual photographs already have been taken.

To test the machine further, researchers now are working with an artificial man composed of a tank of water with a "heart" giving out electrical signals. The machine uses 70 electrodes placed around the chest to pick up electrical signals from the heart and transmit them to a television screen that can be seen and photographed.

The machine for recording heart beats of unborn babies is also known as a fetal electrocardiogram. It is used to monitor the baby's heart condition as indicated by steadiness and rate of the electrocardiogram.

The machine can monitor electronically a baby's heart rate and, if the rate becomes abnormally slow, the doctor can drop too much, can tip off doctors in time to perform a cesarean section.

Other machines of this type have had an error rate of about 13 to 18 per cent, Dr. Schuler said. It is 20 per cent or less, he said, been wrong only once in 250 cases.
