

New Farm Retail Business Gains Premier's Approval

Congratulations were extended on "this wonderful development" as Premier Walter R. Shaw officially opened the new Agro Co-op Feed and Farm Supplies retail business yesterday afternoon. "You seem to have so many things that will supply the farm people of the province," the premier observed.

Others who spoke included Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae, Ralph Miner, merchandising manager, Maritime Co-op services, Moncton; Joe Murphy, for the contractors, Williams, Murphy and MacLeod, and Don Smith, the manager of the business.

Presiding was John A. (Jack) Rodd, Milton, in his capacity as chairman of the board of directors.

One of the interested visitors was Doug Curtis, president of the Farmers Co-operative.

"This is industrial expansion as its best, where you are giving a service to a large number of farmers in the province," the premier enthused.

Recalling that there have been some failures among co-operatives in P.E.I. in the past, the premier emphasized, "the principles of co-operative development are still intact; they are still there, and wherever these principles have been applied, with proper and efficient management, there has been success."

Premier Shaw referred to the Maritime Co-operative Services as "one of the most successful developments in co-operative effort right across Canada, if not on the continent" (MCS is the wholesale co-op enterprise for this endeavour, and they have made the services of Mr. Smith available on a managerial contact. Mr. Smith actually is an employee of MCS, though he is managing the local farmer-owned business.)

DIRECTORS INCLUDE

Congratulating the board of directors — they include Harold Smith, M.L.A. of Pownal — the premier warmly congratulated both Mr. Smith and his good wife, Hazel, who was present on their fine family. The premier noted that the manager is one son, and that "several other sons are doing fine service". One of the others, David Smith, is an agricultural fieldman for the P.E.I. department of agriculture. Another son, Winston, is with the Canada department of agriculture.

"An excellent group of directors" was the comment of the premier who was in top form as he wove some of his best humor into his remarks before he officially opened the plant by cutting the traditional red ribbon that stretched across the door of the plant warehouse.

He congratulated the organization on its growth in the first year — from 18 members to 75 and the ability to declare a modest dividend in the "always very difficult first year of operation." Your performance in this regard "is very encouraging indeed", the smiling premier emphasized.

Mr. MacRae said this development "is tangible evidence that the farmers well-organized can do something for themselves... It is evidence these people have confidence in the agricultural future of this province."

Mr. Smith said that in the very near future, "four milling equipment and bulk unloading facilities will be installed. The steel tanks on the outside he explained, will be for storage of bulk feed arriving on bulk cars. It will be augured from the bulk tanks into truck for delivery to the customer."

This is another step in bringing a faster, more direct movement of feeds to the farmer, and "we hope to keep the price down where we like to see it," Mr. Smith observed.

After the ceremony the fairly large group of visitors enjoyed tea and doughnuts, and a friendly chat, in the building.

A. H. Lemmon Meets Leaders

"Many recent amendments to the Industrial Relations Act have removed certain difficulties which impeded rapid certification of the employees in the construction trades with the result that these as well as other trades may now be dealt with quickly and efficiently by our Labour Relations Board."

City Canvass Nears \$5,000

The Special Names Canvass in Charlottetown for the Salvation Army Building Fund Appeal soared near the \$5,000 mark, it was learned from voluntary workers yesterday.

It was pointed out at Citadel headquarters that the majority of teams have yet to report and indications are that the Army campaign for \$35,000 is meeting a ready and sympathetic support throughout the province.

Ben Arsenault, president of the George R. Pearkes Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, Summerside, and C.R. Craig, secretary-manager, have volunteered their services in organizing the residential canvass in the town. They will have the full co-operation of the Ladies Auxiliary of the branch.

The Special Names and General Business canvass in Summerside is under the direction of Paul Schurman.

Fishing Case Is Adjourned

In Queens County Magistrate Court yesterday afternoon Joseph Arnold Gallant of North Rustico, charged with unlawful fishing trout out of season, had his case adjourned to May 6 at 4 p.m. to fix a date for trial. Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, presided.

Lawson E. MacEachern, Cherry Valley, charged with unlawfully driving a motor vehicle on a highway without said vehicle being constructed to prevent a load from escaping, had his case adjourned to May 6 at 4 p.m. to fix a date for trial.

Both accused were represented by E. Frank Sigsworth.

Labor Spokesman Issues Statement

"We want something on paper. Up until now it's just been words and nothing on paper," was the comment of a spokesman for workers in Summerside yesterday.

The spokesman expressed disappointment however, that management and representatives for the laborers had not sat down at the bargaining table yesterday as was originally announced and come to some partial agreement.

He added that this is the reason a meeting was called for Saturday so the laborers could be told what agreement had been reached at yesterday's protracted meeting.

"Representatives of the companies now say they can't meet until next Thursday," he continued. "This puts us in a bad light. If we return to work Monday, when Thursday rolls around, they (the management) can put off the meeting again for another couple of weeks."

Approximately 80 workers, not counting painters, plumbers and electricians, have registered to date with the local branch of the International Laborers Union of America since it was formed Wednesday night.

75 Students Are Expected

About 75 students, representing most Prince Edward Island high schools, are expected to write placement tests at St. Dunstan's University today for the Alumni Scholarships and the new scholarships being offered by SDU this year.

The scholarships, about 10 in number, are for full-tuition over a four-year period and are valued at \$1,600 each, with \$400 being credited towards the student's tuition each year at SDU.

The placement tests form part of the requirements, with the applicant's high school record also being considered by the SDU Scholarship Committee.

Workers Return To Jobs

A survey of contractors yesterday revealed that the majority of protesting construction workers have returned to their jobs since their walkout protest April 18th.

A number of international representatives were in the province during the strike, helping to direct and organize the men. Included were: Rejean Charlebois, Montreal, representative of the laborer's international union; Elgie Carmichael, Halifax, representative of the electricians international union and Paul E. Wile, Lower Sackville, representative of the operating engineers international union.

The men were asked to "return to work as soon as possible" in a joint statement issued at noon Thursday by Mike Schurman, representative of the P.E.I. Builders Exchange and J. M. McAlinduff, representative of the P. E. I. construction workers.

The statement came as a result of private meetings between management representatives and representatives of the men.

A general meeting is planned here this afternoon.
