RIPLEY'S BELIEVE IT OR NOT



CONTRACT BRIDGE

West dealer. North-South vulnerable. NORTH: A K Q 5 3, 7 5 4, 6 5, K J.

East: A 10 9 8 7 6 3, Q J 8, 10 5, 4. South: A K Q 10 5, K 7 2, A Q 9 6.

The bidding: West North East South Pass Pass 3 4, Pass 3 NT Pass 4 4.

Opening lead—jack of spades. Declarer and East crossed swords in brilliant style in this deal where South staggered into four hearts after East had opened with a nuisance bid of three spades.

East's preemptive bid, inserted to try to make things difficult for the opposition, managed to do just that. South doubled, primarily for takeout, and North was presented with a choice of three possible bids.

He had the option of passing, thus translating the takeout double into a business double; or bidding three notrump; or bidding four hearts with a regged suit. Such wide choices of action are fairly common after a preemptive bid, and it is not surprising that a wrong choice is frequently made in such difficult circumstances.

South decided not to gamble three notrump (which could be defeated with the queen of diamonds lead) and bid four hearts. West led the jack of spades and declarer made the fine play of the three from dummy.

South realized that if he covered with the queen East would win the ace and probably shift to a diamond. This would subject the diamond king to immediate attack and could result in rapid defeat.

Ducking the spade was a great idea and would have succeeded except that East viewed the play with suspicion. It was obvious that South had the only missing spade, the four-spot. Declarer could not be without the four because if he were void in spades, he would automatically have covered the jack with the queen to establish the king as a trick.

So East took the jack with the ace, even though his play established the K-Q as tricks, and led back the queen of diamonds. As a result, declarer went down one. East reasoned that South had not covered the spade because it was against his (declarer's) interest to have East on lead. But, thought East, if it was good for declarer not to have East on lead, then it must be bad for him (East) not to take the lead. East was right.

Pope Revives Old Legend

VAICAN CITY (AP)—Pope John XXIII will wash the feet of 13 men, instead of 12, on Holy Thursday, reviving a legend dating from Pope St. Gregory the Great in the sixth century.

The 13th pair of feet, according to the legend, were the feet of Christ.

According to the story, Pope Gregory bent to wash the feet of 12 beggars brought in from the streets of Rome. After he had washed the feet of 12 men a 13th man still waited. The pontiff, according to the legend, then realized that the 13th person was Jesus and in awe again bent to wash His feet.

The ceremony, followed in ancient times by the pontiffs to recall Christ's washing of His disciples' feet just before the Last Supper, fell into disuse in modern times. Pope John XXIII, who decided to reinstate it, also decided to recall the ancient legend.

The Vatican announced Tuesday that Pope John will wash the feet of 13 student priests when he participates in the ceremony at the Basilica of St. John Lateran.

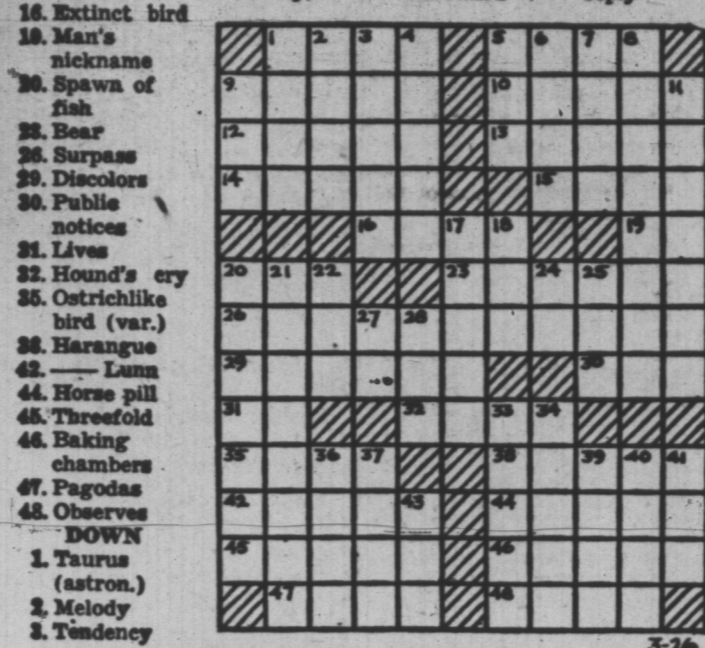
