Island tunnel, beyond giving it a careful consideration. Question of further surveys or estimates was, he said, under consideration.

All committees met again to-day. Another want of confidence motion is to be moved this afternoon. Sir Donald Smith landed at Montreal yesterday. He and Dalton McCarthy will resume their seats in Parliament.
