Inland Revenue.

The Report of the Commissioner of Inland Revenue shows a decrease in the receipts of the last fiscal year. The Commissioner accounts for this by the exceptional entries for duty, both of spirits and tobacco, made in anticipation of the tariff of 1879. These duties, he says, swelled the revenue of that year above the normal amount, and without doubt a large proportion of the duty paid stocks were brought over to 1879-80, thereby decreasing the entries for duty of that year.
In this Province, the report shows a decided increase in the manufacture of tobacco, spirits and malt liquor.

Spread of Diphtheria.

The extended medico-meteorological researches of Dr. Arthur Mitchell, and Alexander Buchan, the noted British meteorologist, conclusively demonstrate the connection between this disease and definite weather stages. "Cold and moist air," they find, "is accompanied with a high death rate from diphtheria,"—conditions which have marked the Atlantic seaboard for the last fortnight, and have been intensified by the heavy rains of Sunday from Virginia to Massachusetts and the cold wave now upon us. The concurrence of low temperature and high humidity in augmenting the malignancy and spread of diphtheria is the more remarkable, as etologists incline to the theory that the malady is originated by organic matter in the air, which is generally neutralized or destroyed by cold weather.

Sir Charles Tupper's Speech.

THE St. John News says: "If the debate on the Pacific Railway contract maintains throughout the vigor and ability impressed on it at the outset by Sir Charles Tupper, it will prove to be a very remarkable discussion—one that will reflect great credit on the Canadian Parliament. Maritime Province men of every shade of political sentiment may well feel proud of the figure cut by Sir Charles, one of their own men, in opening this great debate. The occasion was a grand one. The subject inviting discussion was one of the highest importance, and the consequences involved in the final decision momentous. Sir Charles rose to the level of the occasion and the subject in his opening speech. It is true, that Mr. Blake, in commencing his reply thereto, sneered at it as being an old oration once more repeated. But candid, intelligent Canadians, carefully perusing it, will frankly acknowledge it to be strictly relevant in all its parts to the subject on hand, a clear, consecutive and comprehensive statement of the whole question to be considered, a masterly defence of the bargain to be weighed as against Opposition attacks and breathing throughout a fine, manly patriotic tone.

Important Announcement.

The announcement made by Sir Charles Tupper in his magnificent speech last night, that the Times of yesterday had an article declaring that the Imperial Government would submit to Parliament at its approaching session, a scheme of emigration to Canada, which they proposed to assist, in co-operation with the Canadian Government, is one of the importance of which can hardly be over-estimated. The evidences of a growing interest abroad in this Dominion are accumulating every day. Ten years ago an effort was made, through the agitation carried on by the National Emigration League, to induce the Imperial Government to interest itself in the matter of relieving the distress in Great Britain by assisting the surplus population to emigrate to the colonies. Sir George Grey and Mr. Edward Jenkins held meetings throughout England in order to excite the popular sentiment in favor of the scheme. Mr. McCullough Torrens brought the matter up in Parliament, only to find himself standing almost alone, one of his chief opponents being a member of the present Government, Sir Charles Dilke. The agitation was abandoned as hopeless, and has not since been revived. That we should now, in ten short years afterwards, find ourselves face to face with the announcement that a Government of which Mr. Bright and Sir Charles Dilke are members, are prepared to submit to Parliament a scheme to aid emigration to Canada, is the most striking evidence of the success which has attended the efforts of the Dominion Cabinet in enlisting Imperial interest in the development and prosperity of this country.—*Montreal Gazette.*

Clippings from Late Papers.

The rich and respected President of a Boston gas company lives luxuriously with one wife in the neighborhood of that city. She had no desire, however, to take him away from his second spouse, but demanded a restoration of the property which she had given him years before. He promised to do it.

The town of Lindsay, Ontario, has for some time past been considerably excited owing to a quarrel between a portion of the press and the school trustees, which has resulted in a four-fold libel suit. It appears that the officers in question had insisted, against the will of a part of the community, in retaining in office a teacher who, though well qualified as to ability and scholarship, was not altogether blameless in his habits. The Lindsay Post, which is edited by Mr. Barr, formerly of the Montreal Gazette, considered it a duty to the public to ventilate the matter. In doing so, our contemporary told the School Board some truths which were not very palatable, and the consequence was that four of its members brought libel suits against him, each of them demanding \$5,000 damages. So far, they have only gained by this course a storm of ridicule from the press of the surrounding towns and villages.
