Declare Khrushchev Insulted West At Moscow Dinner Party

LONDON (AP) Two British newspapers claimed Tuesday Nikolai Khrushchev drunkenly insulted Western representatives at a big Moscow party recently. But a foreign office spokesman, questioned about the reports, commented: "I have no reason to believe that anyone was insulted." The occasion was a banquet and garden party given by the Soviet defence ministry June 24 to celebrate Red Air Force Day. The papers The Daily Mail and The Daily Telegraph claimed in one-page stories that both the 62-year-old Khrushchev who is Communist party chief and the 61-year-old Soviet premier Nikolai Bulganin were drunk. The papers said the two argued violently as to who should speak. Khrushchev apparently won, according to the papers which went on to assert that he then insulted nearly every guest of nearly every nationality present — personally as well as nationally. The papers did not say what the insults were. The Daily Mail attributed its information to "an American who was present." The Daily Telegraph's report was dated Washington. In Washington, Gen. Nathan Twining, the U.S. Air Force chief of staff acknowledged that Khrushchev had abused Britain and the United States at the Moscow party which he attended. Interviewed as he emerged from testifying to a congressional committee on his trip to the Soviet Union, Twining said that Khrushchev had been "pretty nasty" at the party. But Twining said Khrushchev "did not insult anybody personally."

Returns From Attending 32nd Convention Y's Men's Clubs

Mr. Charles Linkletter returned to his home in Summerside yesterday after attending the 32nd international convention of Y's Men's Clubs where he was appointed international young adult service director — an office which is one of international Y's Men's major service categories which function in 32 countries of the world. This post, one of the top positions in the international organization carries the responsibility of correlating the young adult program conducted by Y's Men's Clubs in their own communities and in their active support of such programs in the Y. M. C. A.'s on an international scale. This position had been held only twice previously by a Y's Man in Canada, since the organization of the Y's Men's movement in 1920. The convention which Mr. Linkletter attended was held at the Y. M. C. A. conference grounds, Estes Park, Colorado. This convention was attended by 1,500 persons including delegates from Y's Men's Clubs in Hong Kong, Japan, India, Chile, British Guiana, Germany, Belgium, Denmark and Sweden. Mr. Linkletter attended four days of international board convention prior to and following the convention itself in his capacity as international director for the Maritime region, his two-year term in this post expiring with the close of the 1956 convention. His appointment to the position of international young adult service director was made by the newly-elected international president of the Y's Men's movement, Edward S. Miller of Millville, New Jersey.

Want Restrictions On American Coal Imports

OTTAWA (CP)—Commons representatives of Alberta and Nova Scotia coal mining areas say the government should restrict imports of United States coal. The proposal was made Thursday by C. E. Johnston (SC-Breton River) and firmly supported by Clarie Gillis (CCF-Cape Breton South).

Both said that the coal industry, its production slipping steadily in recent years, needs more help. Mr. Johnston said that in the 1954-55 fiscal year, imports of U.S. coal exceeded by 2,413,000 tons the Canadian production of 14,770,000 tons.

If U. S. imports could be reduced by 4,000,000 tons a year, "I am sure our industry would be put back on its feet again."

URGES COAL ZONING Mr. Gillis, a former coal miner, said there would be no difficulty in putting an embargo against a certain amount of U.S. coal. He also suggested a zoning system to ensure markets for Canadian coal.

Mr. Gillis also repeated his request that the federal subvention on freight movement of Canadian coal be increased to absorb the recent seven per cent railway rate increase ordered by the board of transport commissioners.

Miners Minister Prudham made no reply to the proposal for limiting coal imports, presented as the Commons reviewed his departmental spending estimates.
