

Lobster Fishing Shows Increase

The possibility that 1959 total lobster revenues may top \$3,000,000 was seen as official figures released yesterday showed that the value of the Island catch landed to the end of August was already \$2,530,000 with returns for the fall season still to be added.

Last year the total lobster catch was 7,970,000 pounds with a value of \$2,510,000. The catch this year to the end of August was 7,481,000 pounds. Fisheries in general were better for the first seven months of this year by comparison with the same period in 1958. This year the catch was up by 2,500,000 pounds to 20,169,000 with a value of \$2,548,000. This compared with the figures for last year of 17,762,000 pounds valued at \$2,191,000.

22 Kings County Cases Disposed Of By Court

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN A heavy docket of 22 cases confronted Kings County Stipendiary Magistrate James B. Johnston when he held weekly court in Georgetown on Wednesday.

The evidence of one crown witness, Constable D. Hender of the Montague Detachment RCMP, was heard in the case of George Sextus MacPhee of St. Georges who had pleaded not guilty on Oct. 7th to a charge of care and control of a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired.

The accused was represented by J.P. Nicholson. The case was further adjourned to Nov. 4th, due to the fact that a crown witness will be absent from the province for the next two weeks.

The plea of Norman Nicholson of Montague, of guilty to the lesser offense of driving while his ability was impaired, was accepted by the crown. He had originally been charged with driving while intoxicated. He was fined \$75 and costs or seven days. The accused was represented by Mr. Nicholson.

John MacKay of Montague entered a plea of guilty to a charge of having the care and control of a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired. He was fined \$75 and costs or seven days in default.

Walter Glen Farrel of Milltown Cross pleaded guilty to the theft of a quantity of chocolate


