FOR BLOODED STOCK.—A Nashville, Tenn., despatch says that at the closing-out sale of the old Belle Mead Farm and all the stock, on the 24th, 61 head of yearlings sold for a total of \$74,575, or an average of \$1,222; 34 calves for an average of \$1,222, while 27 milks sold at the rate of \$1,373.

A LARGE ESTATE.—It is said that half the residue of the estate of the late John P. Mead, left to Halifax charities, will aggregate fully \$250,000. The appraised value of the estate is \$750,000. Of this amount \$270,000 is invested in American railway stocks, and \$275,000 in Canadian bank and manufacturing stocks.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 29.

In the House this afternoon, in answer to Mr. McNeill, Hon. Mr. Colby said that owing to the absence of the Minister of Marine, no action had yet been taken on the Report of Commander Gordon, R. N., recommending the suspension of Captain Robertson's certificate for one year.

The Government bills respecting the department of the geological survey, the Indian Advancement Act, grants of public lands, and the marriage with a deceased wife's sister Act, were read a second time and passed.

The House went into committee of supply, considering the supplementary estimates for 1889-90. At 11:01 o'clock the Committee rose, and the House then went again into Committee on the Banking Act. Hon. Mr. Foster announced it was the intention to introduce a clause forbidding the assignment, hypothecating or pledging of its notes by a bank. He also moved the addition of provisions giving the Government power to rank upon the assets of an insolvent bank for notes redeemed out of the redemption fund, also that the Government should not be held liable for redemption of notes to any amount greater than the amount there contained in the fund.

The Committee rose and reported progress, and the House adjourned at 12:40.

A Sad Affair.

SHELBURNE, Ont., April 28.

A tragedy occurred on the morning of the 24th, about a mile and a half north of here, at the residence of one Thomas Morrison, a heretofore respectable farmer.

Mrs. Morrison had gone away from home for a couple of days to visit a sick sister, leaving her husband with five children, the eldest a girl of thirteen. The youngest, a bright little boy of a couple of summers, slept with the eldest sister. When the latter awoke this morning she was surprised to find that he was not by her side. She went in search of him and to her horror found the little boy stiff in death, laid out upon a quilt on the kitchen floor. Beside him lay the body of his sister, aged five, and his brother, aged seven. A barrel, half full of water, stood in one corner of the room. By the dripping of the water on the floor the tale was told of their death by drowning. Morrison could not be found. On a table in the dining room was a cup strongly smelling of carbolic acid, and an ounce bottle of the drug, two-thirds full. The neighborhood being aroused, and diligent search instituted, the murderer was found writing in agony on the bank of a creek a quarter of a mile from the house. There was evidence of a terrible struggle.

SHELBURNE, Ont., April 29.

Morrison died at 7:15 a. m. to-day. He made no confession, and did not speak since 11 o'clock last night to attendants.

The Newfoundland Delegates.

HALIFAX, April 28.

The delegates from Newfoundland to lay the case of the people of that Colony before the people of Canada and England in regard to French aggressions on that Island, arrived here to-day and interviewed a number of our merchants. The delegates for England leave via New York to-morrow.
