TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

BAND at the rink to-night.

THE STANLEY arrived at Georgetown from Picton shortly after four o'clock this afternoon.

ANOTHER ONE.—A correspondent of the Farmer reports the death at Granville, Lot 21, recently, of Mrs. William McKay, aged 106 years.

A COMPLAINT.—The Summerside Journal is complaining about the prevalence of corner loafing in that town, and of the large number of dogs running about without collars.

WILD GESE.—The Journal reports that Mr. A. E. Holland, St. Eleanors, shot five wild geese on Monday last. These are the first we have heard of being killed near Summerside this season.

BREACH OF PROMISE.—Hamilton, Ont., is to have a breach of promise case. The plaintiff is Miss Myra Hall, a typewriter, and the defendant is one Thomas O'Callaghan. The amount of compensation claimed is \$25,000.

FATALELY SCALDED.—A few days ago, the four-year-old daughter of Peter Lawson, of Nilestown, Ont., fell into a pail of hot water that stood on the floor, and was fatally scalded, dying in twelve hours after the accident.

STILL HALE AND HEARTY.—Mrs. Antoine St. Germain, of St. Guillaume, d'Upton, Quebec, celebrated the one hundredth anniversary of her birth a few days ago. The old lady, who is still hale and hearty, danced a minuet on the occasion.

S. P. C. A.—A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals was held at the Stipendiary Magistrate's office at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The members are evidently determined to make the organization a valuable adjunct to our humane institutions.

UNSEATED.—Councillor Day, one of the newly elected board at Moncton, N. B., has been unseated by a vote of 3 to 2 on account of having made application for a town contract. This appears to be cheese-paring, no contract having been entered into. Mr. Day will probably re-offer for election on the 2nd April.

A QUICK PASSAGE.—We learn from the Journal that the bark Charles E. Lefurey, Capt. Read, arrived at Baltimore from Bremen on the 13th inst., after a passage of thirty-two days, one of the quickest made to that port by a sailing vessel for some years. She was only twenty days from the Lizard to Baltimore.

STRANGE, IF TRUE.—The Journal says: We understand that one of the eastern Post Offices is kept by a person who cannot read, and neither can any of his family. Sometimes the work of the office is done by a neighbor's daughter, and at other times people are asked to look over the mail matter in order to select their own therefrom.

A VALUABLE FIND.—Benj. Johnson owns a farm in Rush Valley, U. T., upon which he has just discovered a mine of natural shoe blacking. An analysis of this peculiar material shows that it contains 16 per cent. carbon, 34 per cent. aluminum, and the remainder clay. When taken out the material is moist and soft, and when used as a shoe blacking produces a fine polish which is not easily destroyed.

THE CHARTER EXTENDED.—Through the efforts of Richard Hunt, Esq., at Ottawa, the charter of the Summerside Bank has been extended for one year from the date of its expiration in May, 1890. It is, we learn the intention of the Dominion Government to make a revision of at least the banking laws, and an effort will be made to have the amount of capital required made such as to allow the organizing of local banks of small capital. At present these laws demand a subscribed capital of half a million with fifty per cent. paid up.—Farmer.

FREDERIC VILLIERS.—As will be seen by the account of Mr. Villiers' lecture, published elsewhere, that intrepid war correspondent will remain one night longer in Halifax than the engagement spoke for. He will, however, arrive here on Saturday evening, and speak in the Y. M. C. A. Hall on Monday and Tuesday evenings. The tickets are nearly all sold—only a limited number having been issued. To those who have not purchased, we would say do so at once.

DIED ABOARD.—We regret to learn of the accidental death at Boston, on Monday, 25th inst., of Mr. Thomas Humphrey, formerly of Summerside. No particulars of the accident have yet been received. Mr. Humphrey was ship builder for Hon. John Lefurey from 1865 to 1872, during which time he built several vessels, the last one being the brig Doretta, 352 tons. He then went to Alberton, where he built for Mr. Benjamin Rogers for several years prior to moving to Boston. The deceased was the father of Mrs. Thomas Henderson, of Summerside, and was much respected.—Journal.

New Glasgow Notes.

Obituary.

LONDON, March 27.

The Duke of Buckingham is dead, aged 66 years.

John Bright died at 8.30 o'clock this morning. John Bright was the son of the late Jacob Bright, and was born on November 16th, 1811. It was in 1839 as a member of the Anti-Corn Law League that he first distinguished himself. The funeral of John Bright will take place Saturday.

In the Commons to-day W. H. Smith, Government leader, with much emotion referred to the death of John Bright. He said he would postpone his remarks on Bright until Friday, when Gladstone would be present.

A Woman in the Case.

St. Louis, Mo., March 27.

A venerable looking well dressed man went to the Hotel Porter last night, accompanied by a good looking woman and registered as S. M. Waite and wife, of Florida. This morning they had breakfast served in their room and the woman left the hotel and did not return. Later Waite was found in a dying condition with a bottle of morphine near him. Soon after he died and the police are looking for the woman.

Censuring the "Globe."

MONTREAL, March 27.

At a meeting of the Club National this evening, L. Gouin, Premier Mercier's son-in-law, moved the following resolution which was adopted: "While thanking the Globe for services rendered to the Liberal party in the past, this club exceedingly regrets the turn over of that journal on the question of the Jesuits' estates and Provincial authority, and finds itself under the painful necessity to disavow that newspaper as a Liberal organ."

Charged With Conspiracy.

PITTSBURG, Pa., March 27.

A woman named Thurng was arrested in Allegheny City last night, charged with conspiring to kill her husband to obtain \$2,000 life insurance. It is alleged she entered into a conspiracy with a man who was to do the job for \$20. Instead of killing Thurng, however, the man informed the police, who arrested her.

Disastrous Fire.

SCRANTON, Pa., March 27.

A fire broke out this morning in the salesroom of the Globe Warerooms, the largest dry goods establishment in the city. The firemen battled with the flames for nearly three hours before they had them under control. The stock was valued at \$200,000. The loss is almost total.

Disabled Steamer Arrives.

BALTIMORE, Md., March 27.

The agents to-day received a despatch from Newport announcing the arrival of the disabled steamship Yedmandale, from New Orleans for Rouen. The safe arrival of the Yedmandale nearly confirms the fears felt for the gunboat Conserva, and it is probable she is the one wrecked.

Hawey Arrested.

TORONTO, March 27.

W. H. Hawey, who murdered his wife and two children at Guelph, was arrested here to-night. He had telegraphed to his son to meet him at the Palmer House, and the police waited for him and arrested him on his way there. Hawey no doubt is insane.

Col. O'Brien's Resolution.

OTTAWA, March 27.

In the Commons this afternoon the debate on Col. O'Brien's resolution asking dissolution of the Jesuit Estates Act was resumed and continued till the House adjourned at 11.50 p. m., when the debate was also adjourned until to-morrow.

Accidentally Shot.

CARLEISLE, Ark., March 27.

Alderman Samuel Wellar, of Little Rock, was accidentally shot and killed to-day while hunting with a party of gentlemen. Wellar was a Canadian by birth and has two brothers living in Canada who are distinguished political leaders.

Shot During a Row.

OMAHA, Neb., March 27.

John Rosenburger, a farmer, shot dead Andrew Casteletine in a row over a trivial matter yesterday. He then burned his own house to the ground and shot himself dead.

Victoria College.

TORONTO, March 27.

Rev. Dr. Potts states that he has now the amount of money necessary to start building Victoria College, and operations will be commenced without delay.

A Family Poisoned.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., March 27.

A family of six persons were poisoned at Plymouth this morning by eating wild turnips in a mistake for horse radish. The physicians say two will die.

Strike Ended.

FALL RIVER, Mass., March 27.

The strike of the 9,000 weavers of this city ended this morning, and the operatives will return to work on the old basis.

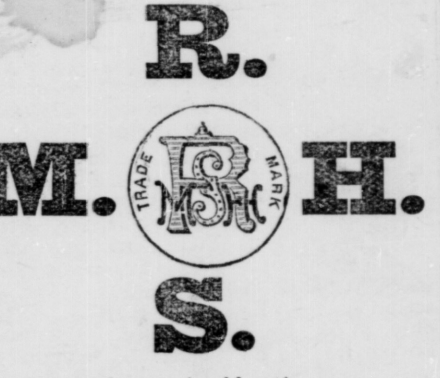
