

# Cassius Defeats Williams By TKO At 1:08 Of 3rd.

HOUSTON (AP) — Cassius Clay floored plodding 33-year-old Cleveland Williams four times and stopped him on a technical knockout in 1:08 of the third round Monday night in his seventh defence of the world heavyweight boxing championship.

Williams, who still has a policeman's bullet in his body, was no match for the undefeated 24-year-old champion.

Referee Harry Kessler of St. Louis ended the slaughter by stopping the two men as Williams wobbled on his knees with eyes glazed and no longer able to protect himself.

Clay, who prefers to be known as Muhammad Ali, floored the once-fearful slugger three times in the second round and once in the third before the end.

Apparently stung by those who said he could not punch, Clay swarmed over the challenger in the second round and

threw every punch in the book after feeling him out in the first.

A right hand dropped Williams for the first time in the second round. He was down for about two and then took the mandatory eight count.

**HIT BY BARRAGE**  
A barrage of blows sent the stunned Williams to the deck again, but he popped up quickly. Once again, referee Kessler tolled the mandatory eight count.

Actually, Williams was saved by the bell at the end of the second. A right hand by Cassius sent him floundering on his back, apparently finished for the night. When the count had reached five the bell sounded. Cassius came out for the kill in the third, throwing caution to the wind as he swarmed to the attack. Down went the Houston veteran again, shaken and in bad shape.

After the mandatory eight

count, Clay resumed his punishing barrage until referee Kessler stopped it.

As he left the ring, Clay pointed to Ernie Terrell, the World Boxing Association champ, at ringside and said, "you're next."

"I am ready," said Terrell, who is supposed to be set for a bout with Clay Feb. 6 at an undetermined site.

A record indoor crowd of 35,460 turned out at the Astro-dome, but didn't get much for their money. Williams, a 5-4-1 underdog, never had a chance.

**BLEED FROM NOSE**  
Cleveland pummed at Clay with about three punches in the first, and the crowd yelled. But Clay was just getting him up for the kill. Blood trickled from Cleveland's nose at the end of the first and flowed freely after the second.

Fighting without mouthpiece, Williams tried to carry the bout to the champ in the early seconds, but Clay wouldn't stand still for him. The champ danced

away, flicking an occasional jab and bewildering Williams with his speed.

The few blows that Williams did manage to land appeared to have no effect on the champ, who weighed 212½ to 210½ for the challenger.

Clay, the busiest heavyweight king since Joe Louis, was making his sixth defence within the space of a year and his fifth in 1966.

The string started with Floyd Patterson in Las Vegas, Nev., last Nov. 22 and continued with a decision over Canadian champion George Chuvalo at Toronto March 29, a sixth-round TKO over Henry Cooper at London May 21, a third-round knockout of Brian London at London Aug. 6 and a 12th-round TKO over Karl Mildenerger in Frankfurt, West Germany, Sept. 10.

It was the 27th straight victory for the unbeaten former Olympic champ from Louisville, Ky. Only five have gone the route.

# Geoffrion Makes Fast Comeback

NEW YORK (AP)—Montreal has become just another place to visit for Bernie Geoffrion, the 35-year-old hockey wonder who's making New York Rangers go Boom Boom.

Geoffrion, former Montreal Canadiens ace who returned to the National Hockey League with the Rangers this season after a two-year layoff, completed a seven-point weekend spree by setting up three goals in New York's 5-2 victory over Detroit Red Wings Sunday night.

He has registered 11 scoring points in 10 starts, including a breakaway goal and three assists against his former mates at Montreal Saturday.

"It was nice to score a goal at Montreal, but I was more happy that we won the game," Boom Boom said.

## Round By Round Resume

**ROUND ONE**  
Williams chased the champ, who had his hands down and danced around the ring. No blows were struck during the first 20 seconds as they maneuvered. Williams had a left hand blocked and then missed with another jab.

Clay jabbed with his left, his first punch after a minute of dancing. Clay jabbed with his left to the head and then let loose with a fast flurry of jabs to the head.

Clay shot a left to the body and three lefts to the head. Williams shot over a stiff left jab to the head but took six punches to the head and body in return. Clay let loose with another volley of eight punches to the head and body as Williams kept moving in.

Williams got in a short left to the head and took four more fast punches to the head in return. There was a trickle of blood from Williams' nose.

Clay's round.

**ROUND TWO**  
Williams was not using a mouth piece. Clay shot over two jabs and a light left hook to the head early in the second round.

Williams connected with a short left hook to the jaw but missed with a right aimed to the head. Williams caught the bobbing champ with a short right uppercut to the jaw.

Clay came back with two light lefts to the head. Four more jabs to the head and face brought blood from Williams' nose.

Clay battered his charging opponent with both hands to the head. A short left and right to the head dropped Williams. He was up at two. After the count at eight, another barrage dropped Williams to the deck again.

He was up at two and again took a mandatory-eight count. Another barrage dropped Williams flat on his back. The bell sounded at the count of five.

Clay's round.

**ROUND THREE**  
Clay shot over two lefts and a right early in the round. Another fast volley of punches dropped Williams to the deck again for the count of four.

Williams' face was smeared with blood. Clay hammered Williams with both hands, and the referee stopped the fight.

## Saskatchewan Halfway To Cup But There Is A Catch

WINNIPEG (CP) — Saskatchewan Roughriders are half way there, but now they must do something they've never done before to reach the Grey Cup classic for the first time in 16 years.

Saskatchewan beat Winnipeg Blue Bombers 14-7 Sunday to open the best-of-three Western Football Conference final.

The rub is they've been in an identical situation twice before and both times they failed to get to the Grey Cup.

In 1941, Riders beat Winnipeg 24-6 in the first game. But the Manitoba crew made the first of five rebounds from opening-game reverses, 12-22 and 8-2. Saskatchewan upset Edmonton 23-22 to start the 1956 final but the Eskimos struck back 20-13 and 51-7.

Roughriders took the comeback road to the Grey Cup in 1961. They slipped Edmonton 12-5 and 19-18 after a 15-11 first-game defeat—then lost 21-14 to Ottawa Rough Riders.

**BOMB CATS**  
Ottawa all but wrapped up the Eastern Conference championship Sunday, bombing Hamilton Tiger-Cats 30-1 in the first game of a two-game total-point series.

The 1966 Grey Cup final is in Vancouver Saturday, Nov. 26. The Saskatchewan faithful, who can watch the second game on the CTV national network, should be reminded that Winnipeg coach Bud Grant has a habit of winning playoffs.

Since Grant took the reins in 1957, Bombers have won nine of 10 playoffs. They took the WFC crown in 1955 by scrambling to 15-11 and 19-12 decisions after Calgary Stampeders opened with a 27-9 victory.

OTTAWA (CP) — Ottawa Rough Riders enjoyed the spoils of victory by relaxing Monday but their respite from the football field was brief.

They return to practice sessions this afternoon.

After their convincing 30-1 win over Hamilton Tiger-Cats Sunday in the opener of the two-game, total-points Eastern Football Conference final, Riders can't be blamed for feeling they'll be in the Grey Cup classic Nov. 26 in Vancouver.

But they still have another 90 minutes of football to play against Hamilton in Sunday's game in Montreal.

Coach Frank Clair and his assistant, Al Bruno, spent Monday afternoon watching one of the best movies they have ever seen—the film of Sunday's victory.

But their biggest problem is how to get the team inspired for a repeat performance when they hold a comfortable 29-point lead in the series. Clair likely will point to past performances.

It was only two years ago that Ottawa beat Hamilton 30-13 in the opener of the finals, then blew the 17-point lead as the Ticats recovered with 26-8 victory to win the round 39-38.

In 1961, Toronto Argonauts were in a similar position against Hamilton but their 19-point lead vanished in the final game which Ticats won 48-2.

In 1959 it was the same story with Hamilton winning the final game 21-7 to erase a 12-point Ottawa lead.

But the Riders are a different type of team this year. They have the rough, rugged defence that used to be a Hamilton trademark. They held the Ticats to a mere eight first downs Sunday and Hamilton's only point was conceded on a punt.

Middle linebacker Ken Lehmann was the only Rider casualty Sunday but Bruno said his bruised ankle won't keep him out of the second game.
