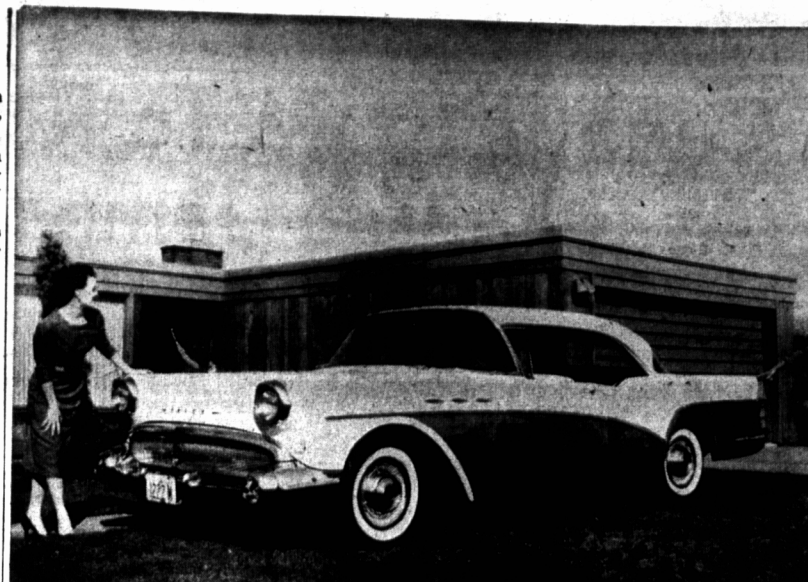

**DR. N.L. BOWEN**  
Was Well Known In This Province

Well known this Province, Dr. Norman L. Bowen, M.A. '07 B.S. '09, LL.D. '41 one of Queen's University most illustrious graduates died at Washington, D.C. on September 11 at the age of sixty-eight. Internationally famous as an authority on the nature and origin of rocks, Dr. Bowen retired in 1953 from the staff of the Geophysical Laboratory of the Carnegie Institute in Washington. He had been with the Institute since college days, with the exception of a short break when he returned to Queen's as professor of Mineralogy, and the period 1937-45 when he was Distinguished Service Professor of Petrology at the University of Chicago. His fame was world-wide and his work was recognized as the most fundamental and far-reaching of any produced in recent years.

He leaves to mourn his wife, Mary Lamont a native of Montague, his daughter, Catherine, wife of Dr. Jerrold Orne of Montgomery, Alabama, three grandchildren, Mary, John and Jean Orne.

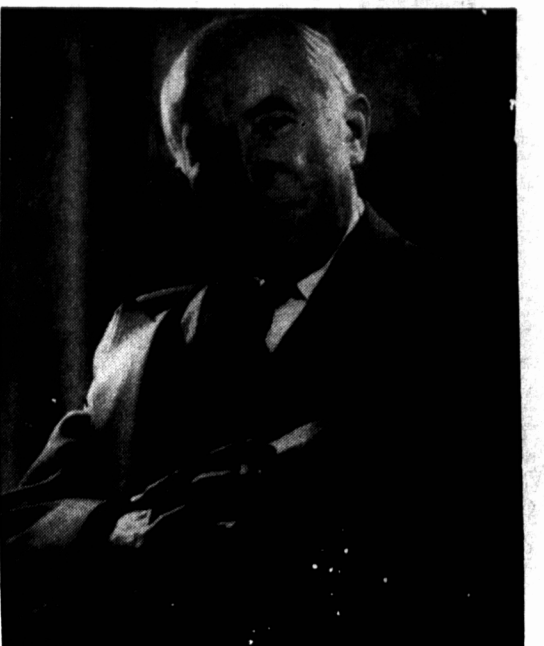
**AMONG THE FARMERS**

**AGRICULTURAL EXODUS**  
The suggestion of the Prime Minister that certain areas of farm land should be taken out of production will be received with mixed reactions, the reactions will vary from outright approval to frustration and even to sorrow. The latter will be occasioned by reflection on the fact that a great deal of hard work and high hopes went into the carving out of the wilderness a home-developed into a farm. It is not easy to wrest arable land from the grip of the forest, those who did it had energy, determination and enthusiasm and accepted the challenge which has always been the guiding star of the pioneer. By dint of toil and sacrifice many of the areas referred to by the Prime Minister have provided themselves with homes, buildings, equipment, schools, churches and a wide variety of services. These all represent substantial investment, is this investment to be sacrificed without regrets and without any effort to salvage it? It may well be at the present time there are too many persons, and some of them are in high places, who are ready to judge the rural home and the rural community entirely upon economic grounds. The value of rural contribution to the nation is not measured solely in terms of fat hogs and cash crops. Rural areas have an important role to play in the development of human resources and in providing the men and women who form an important part of the population of our country.

There will be those who see in the Prime Minister's recommendation an admission of failure on the part of Canada to develop policies that will enable hard-working, diligent and frugal people to maintain a way of life which even with its difficulties had much to recommend it. The Prime Minister's suggestion is now being followed but unfortunately much of the land that has been taken out of production is not in any way marginal. It is questionable whether the required increases in food production can

be brought about on the one hand while forcing farm land out of production on the other. The Canadian farmer is being given at the present time little if any real encouragement to produce, he has become a captive of the industry and in a large percentage of cases produces only on compulsion of economic forces over which he appears to have little control and over whose operations governments do not appear to be unduly concerned.

**EXTENSION**  
Agricultural extension may be defined as bringing to the farmer the information gained from experiments and research in matters relating to crops, livestock, farm management including current information of production and marketing. Thus it will be seen that extension is really another name for education carried on after formal schooling has ceased. In Canada no federal and ten provincial governments are involved in securing such information, with the Federal government doing the lion's share of the work in that respect but leaving the spreading of the information to the provinces. Perhaps in this respect much of the difficulty of getting this information accurately and promptly to the farmer. The people who gather the information are not in a position to spread it and those who do spread it are getting a second-hand product and in many cases have received little if any training in the techniques of extension work. A great mass of information is available to the farmer far more material that most (Continued on page 11)

**Reports Highest Single Catches By Souris Dragger This Season**

At least three, and possibly a fourth dragger operating out of Souris this season will have landed over a million pounds of fish before operations come to a close was revealed yesterday by Mr. Eugene Gorman, Deputy Minister of Fisheries who stated that 12 boats as of November 9 had landed 8,700,000 lbs. Last year there was only one boat that produced more than a million pounds for the season.

While complete figures are not available for the season's catch, it is estimated that it will be slightly higher than last year when the total value landed by dragger was \$258,000. The biggest part of the catch this year will be made up of haddock and flounders. In 1955 flounders were landed in a greater proportion of 11 to 6 over haddock but this year there seems to be an equal amount of each caught.

The average catch per boat has risen by 12 per cent from 1952 which would indicate increased efficiency in fishing methods. In 1955 the average earnings per boat owner was \$3,785. This is a decided increase over 1952 when the average per boat owner was \$2,517. The net crew share per man per day was \$15.27.
