PROVINCIAL FARMERS AND DAIRYMEN'S ASSOCIATION.

The Annual Meeting - Proceedings in Brief.

THE annual meeting of the Provincial Farmers and Dairymen's Association was held in this city on Tuesday of this week, the President, Walter Simpson, Esq., of Bay View, in the chair.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was among those who were in attendance; and he gave the Association a short address.

The accounts of the year were submitted and passed.

The correspondence between Sir Louis Davies and the railway authorities in reference to the resolution passed at the last meeting of the Association and forwarded to Ottawa with respect to the proposed establishment of express offices throughout the Province and also through freight rates on cattle in transit between points in the mainland and points in this province, was submitted. The gist of the correspondence is that as to these matters the farmers of this province have not much to complain about. An interesting paper on "The Economical use of Lime," was read by Mr. Carson, of Bonshaw, and discussed by the President and Messrs. David Rogers, David Arbing and J. S. Clarke.

Then followed a discussion concerning the Management of Orchards—as to whether or not it is better to cultivate them or to let them grow in grass and manured on the top of the ground. The consensus of the opinions elicited was that it was better to cultivate orchards from the beginning.

SUDDEN DEATH.

Mr. Thos. Leclair, a clerk in the employ of Messrs Myrick & Co, Tignish, was found dead in his bed on Sunday morning after being in his usual good health when retiring about 12 o'clock Saturday night. He was about 40 years old and unmarried, had always enjoyed good health during the twenty years he was in the Messrs Myrick's employ. An autopsy was held Sunday evening by Dr. Murphy assisted by Dr's Ross, of Alberton, and Myrick of Tignish, when the cause of death was found to be cerebral thrombosis. Mr. Leclair was universally respected and a general favorite in the large firm that employed him. He was a member of Branch No. 281, C. M. B. A., Tignish, and this society had the funeral arrangements in charge. Almost the full membership of this large branch was in the procession and the funeral which took place yesterday, was, in consequence, large and imposing. The deceased gentleman's family have the sympathy of the whole community.

THE SUPREME COURT.

Anner, Lower Montague; Benjamin Aitken, Lower Montague; Joseph Fairchild, Georgetown; William Gordon, Brudenell.

In the course of an able and eloquent address to the jury, the learned Judge paid a fitting tribute to our volunteers on active service in South Africa, and made a kindly reference to the late lamented "Father Francis."

There being no criminal cases before the jury they were discharged. Before their discharge the jury brought in a report which had a special bearing upon encroachments on the highways in King's County, a state of affairs which, we understand, obtains to a considerable extent in Georgetown.

Alder Brehaut was on motion of Attorney General McKinnon, admitted an attorney of the court.

Upon motion of Mr. J. A. Mathieson an order was made for the examination of Mr. W. D. Ross preparatory to his admission as an attorney.

PORTLAND, O., July 17.—The Chinese population of Portland exceeds 50,000. The leading Chinese merchants have expressed their loyalty to the United States government, and this dissipated a great feeling of hostility which might otherwise have developed towards the Chinese.
