Clean-Up Week Is Boosted By Charlottetown's Mayor

There is a special drive behind Clean-Up Week this year because of the forthcoming visit of H.M. Queen Elizabeth II and H.R. Prince Philip. His Worship Mayor Edwin C. Johnstone has proclaimed June 1st to 6th Clean-Up Week in Charlottetown and the Charlottetown Board of Trade has called upon its members and citizens generally to give full support to the City Council in making Charlottetown

look its best.

The Junior Board of Trade are sparking the program to draw the attention of citizens of Charlottetown that it is now time to fix-up, clean-up and paint-up their premises. Ian MacLeod, president of the Junior Board of Trade and Aidan Sheridan, chairman of Clean-up Week, were photographed yesterday with Edson Tanton, who started off the campaign by painting his residence at 80 Ambrose Street.

After the long winter and spring there is much to be done in order to have every home and business premises looking its best. Jaycees will be out all next week with rakes, wheelbarrows, paint brush and hammer to encourage their fellow citizens by example.

Every year they have had most encouraging support from citizens and this year they hope that the results will be even more successful.

It is pointed out that it is not too early to order materials in order to make Charlottetown a city of gay flags and colourful decorations during the Royal visit. The main thing, however, is that it should be neat and sparkling, a city that all can be proud of.

Ch'town Residents Are Fined For Short Lobster Possession

Two residents of Charlottetown were convicted in Queen's County Magistrate's Court, Friday afternoon, on charges of having possession of undersized lobsters.

One charged with having 63 of the lobsters was given a fine of \$35 and costs or 30 days in jail, and the other for having 31 lobsters in his possession received a fine of \$25 and costs or 30 days.

Charged with shooting game birds on a Sunday, a Summerside resident was given an adjournment until Monday for consideration, by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C.

Evidence revealed that the accused had on Sunday, May 17th, been discovered by the RCMP shooting Shag (Cormorant) in the vicinity of Cape Tryon lighthouse. These birds are protected under the Migratory Birds Convention Act.

THEFT CHARGES
Two young men from Inkermen convicted on charges of the theft of a quantity of hardwood, the property of John Gilis, of Springton, valued under \$50 were each fined \$25 and costs or 30 days. One of the accused was

also convicted for the taking of a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner (joyriding) and was given a fine similar to that on the first count.

A New Glasgow man charged with driving while intoxicated, entered a plea of not guilty, and was remanded until June 5th and released on his own recognizance.

A Charlottetown resident whose trial on the charge of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol had been previously adjourned, was further adjourned until June 5th following the hearing of the evidence of three defence witnesses.

SPEEDING
A resident of Rollo Bay West and another from Winsloe both convicted of speeding were each given fines of \$10 and costs or 10 days. For operating motor vehicles with defective equipment (lights, etc.), a man from Bonshaw and one from Dunstaffnage were each fined \$5 and costs or five days.

Similar fines were imposed upon residents of St. Peter's Road and Summerside for driving without an operators licence. Two

accused from Charlottetown and Fredericton both convicted for failing to stop at a stop sign were each given \$5 fines or five days.

For having intoxicating liquor in a place other than their residences, persons from New

Haven, Dunstaffnage and Charlottetown, each received fines of \$20 and costs or 30 days. Convicted of being intoxicated in a public place a city man was given a fine of \$30 and costs or 15 days.

Although he called his trip a personal visit to old comrades, there is no doubt that such a call would be very beneficial to relations between Great Britain and the United States. Besides spending considerable time with President Eisenhower, he visited Walter Reid Army Hospital where he met with General George Marshall who is quite ill and the late Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Although we would have liked to have seen the old warrior again, all will appreciate the circumstances, and will be pleased that he was able to have a few days spent in a friendly personal visit with a few of the American statesmen who have been so instrumental in world affairs for the past number of years.

MANITOBA ELECTION
Residents of Manitoba no doubt will be pleased that they will be free from elections for possibly three years at least. During the last two years they have had two Provincial and two Federal elections, which are rather heavy let for the ordinary citizen. The results were a splendid victory for the able young Leader, Duff Roblin, who last year carried Manitoba to a minority P.C. government for the first time in 3 years.

This time he won 34 of the seats and will probably obtain the other two which are deferred to a later date. He increased his popular vote from 5 points which were lost by the Liberals, and the CCF picked up about 3% which were taken from the former Social Credit strength. Ex-Premier Campbell barely held his seat and four of his former cabinet Ministers were defeated.

The Liberals retained the official opposition by one seat over the CCF and between the minority parties held 21 seats. An interesting feature about this election was that according to our members who went home for short periods during the election,

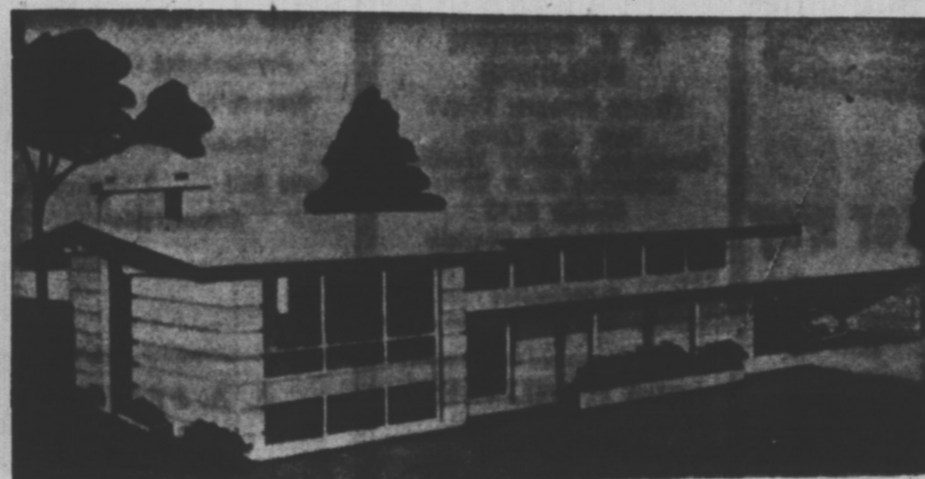
