[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] English Mediation. LONDON, Nov. 17. The Morning Post says it learns that the Government of China having manifested a readiness to accept English mediation upon the questions at issue with France, M. Ferry, Prime Minister and Acting Minister of Foreign Affairs of France, has notified M. Waddington, French Ambassador to England, of his intention to inform him shortly of the conditions upon which France will be disposed to accept mediation. Standard Time. BOSTON, Nov. 17. The standard time went into general effect throughout the United States to-day. SACKVILLE, N. B., Nov. 19. All the telegraph offices of the Western Union and Great Northwestern Telegraph Companies, were to-day ordered to use the standard time. A Credit Limit. MONTREAL, Nov. 17. The leather merchants, at their meeting last evening, passed a motion limiting the time of credit to four months; for prompt cash, 4 per cent. will be allowed; at 30 days 3 per cent., and after that at the rate of 1 per cent., until four months are up. This arrangement to commence January 1st next. Hudson Bay Company. TORONTO, Nov. 17. A special cable to the Globe says the report of the Hudson Bay Company was issued yesterday. The companies' ships have not yet returned from Hudson Bay, and returns of last year's outfit were not completed, but it is expected they will not fall short of the average of recent years. The Morrice Estate. MONTREAL, Nov. 17. Morrice's estate was formerly transferred to trustees yesterday—all parties concerned having signed notaries deed. Morrice will act as agent in winding up. Snow-shoeing and sleighing are in full blast here. Dufferin's Opinion. OTTAWA, Nov. 17. Sir John A. Steamer Burnt. NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 17. Steamer "S. H. Parisot" was burned this morning at Bullets Bayou, eight miles from Neuchez. No lives were lost. Her cargo was 310 bales of cotton, 1,300 sacks of oil cake, and 500 barrels of oil. The total loss is \$200,000. Disastrous Accident. ST. REATOR, ILL., Nov. 17. The accident near this place yesterday on the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railway, was more disastrous than before reported. Seven persons were killed, and seven seriously injured. Vessel Lost. CLEVELAND, Nov. 17. The barque "Ajan" which was being towed by the steam barge "Ohio" on the night of the 13th inst., and which broke away has never been heard of since. It is supposed she is lost with all her crew. Steamer Sunk. LONDON, Nov. 17. The British steamer "Condon" from Liverpool sank off Minden, Holland, to-day during a violent storm. Eighteen persons were lost, including the engineers who were killed by the bursting of boilers. Murder Most Foul. BROOKVILLE, LI., Nov. 17. On Saturday night Mrs. Lydia Maybee, aged 71, and daughter, aged 37, were murdered by persons unknown. Mr. Maybee, who is an invalid, was found in bed unconscious from wounds. Steamer Wrecked. PARIS, Nov. 17. During the gale on Thursday night the Lehigh Transportation Company's steamer "Fred Mercer" was wrecked. The vessel and cargo were worth \$85,000. A Confidence Man Caught. MONTREAL, Nov. 17. Charles Hammond, an American confidence man has been sentenced to four years in the penitentiary. He had operated quite extensively here. Factory Destroyed. CITY OF MEXICO, Nov. 17. The San Fernando cotton factory in Hatpan, here, was destroyed by fire to-day. Five operatives were burned to death. Loss \$600,000. Levis Election. QUEBEC, Nov. 17. The Levis local election took place on the 16th. The Liberal Candidate, Le-Maux, was elected by a majority of over 100. Snow in Ontario. TORONTO, Nov. 17. Reports from points in Ontario state six to eighteen inches of snow have fallen.

Wharf Destroyed. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 17. The American Steamship Company's wharf was destroyed by fire on Saturday night. Loss \$100,000. Death to Egyptians. LONDON, Nov. 17. A dispatch from Cairo confirms the death of Commander Moncrieff and the annihilation of an Egyptian force of 500. Steamer Wrecked. LONDON, Nov. 18. The British steamer "Hymettus" was wrecked in a storm on the Dutch coast to-day. Few of the crew were saved. Statement Denied. PARIS, Nov. 17. The statement that England will act as mediator between France and China is denied. A Grand Turk Dead. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 17. Safvet Pasha ex-Grand Vizier, is dead. Weather Bulletin. A sensational case, which was privately heard at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, last Friday, has just come to light. Anderson, a medical student, seduced a young girl, a Roman Catholic, and alleges he was enforced to marry her by a priest, a revolver being used as a persuader. By his father's will it was enacted that, if he married a Roman Catholic, his inheritance, which amounts to \$6,000, would revert to the Protestant Orphan's Home, and in view of this fact, he sought redress in the Court of Chancery. Vice-Chancellor Proudfoot annulled the marriage, on the ground that both parties must consent of their own free will, before the marriage contract can be legal. Much sympathy is felt for the young lady, who belongs to a highly respectable family. The consumption of oysters in New York is estimated to cost \$5,000,000 annually. At Boston the annual expenditure under this item is set down at \$1,700,000, and at Philadelphia at \$1,500,000.
