After the Battle.

VICTORY! A short and exciting contest has resulted in another great and signal triumph for the Liberal-Conservative Party in Prince Edward Island.

The victory is the more gratifying in that it was won by fair means. Liberal-Conservative candidates went to the country relying upon the record of the Government, and upon their own personal characters and qualifications.

It is not often that a Government enters upon a Third Term; and we have to congratulate the Sullivan-Ferguson Administration upon their remarkable success.

Poisoned Weapons.

A GREAT many persons consider the use of any weapon which will injure "the other side" quite justifiable at election times; and we are not disposed, so soon after the glorious victory of Wednesday, to criticise very severely the weapons employed by the Opposition.

The first is bigotry. The man or party exciting religious prejudice to effect a political purpose, uses a weapon which leaves a rankling wound upon the body politic.

The Duke of Argyll publishes a letter opposing the grant of a majority in the next Parliament to Mr. Gladstone. In the letter occurs the following sentence: "Splendid as Mr. Gladstone's powers long have been, no such confidence ought to be placed in any one human being on questions of such importance as asked of the people of England on behalf of the Premier in the present electoral controversy."

The other weapon, to which we refer, is strong drink. We deeply regret that it was freely used throughout the Province during the late contest. Said a poor woman at the meat market yesterday: "There'll be many a sore head this day; and many a sore heart too."

An Increasing Vote.

The poll on Wednesday was much larger than that of the General Election of 1882. Nearly every candidate who ran in the two elections received more votes in 1886 than in 1882. Here are some of the returns of the two elections:

Tariff Prospects in the States.

THE Morrison tariff bill has been again defeated in the United States House of Representatives, by a vote of 157 against 140. Remarking upon this the Monetary Times, of Toronto, says:—

"There is no likelihood of tariff reform being obtained from the present Congress, and it is uncertain whether a future Congress may be more favorably disposed. Two things which work against tariff reform are that the Democrats are no longer a unit for Free Trade, and that the extension of cotton manufactures in the south creates a new local interest in favor of protection."

In striking contrast with the statistics of the iron trade of the United States recently given in these columns are those of the same industry in Great Britain. On June 1st the iron furnaces of the former country were producing more iron than at any previous time in the history of the United States, and the increase in output for the year has been from 75 to 80 per cent.

Mr. Parnell, in a recent speech, said "The separation idea is ridiculous. If separation were ever attempted it would be in opposition to a moral power such as existed in America in 1861."

Supreme Court.

Court met at 11 o'clock; Judge Peters presiding. The Massey Manufacturing Co. vs. Patrick Higgins. This is an action to recover the price of a mowing machine, the use of which the defendant had and for which he refuses to pay.

In the case of Ellen McKenna vs. Terrence McAttee, for rape, the Grand Jury returned "no bill."

The Grand Jury will probably be discharged this evening as there is no further business to transact.
