Britain Bans All Subversives From Singapore Parliament

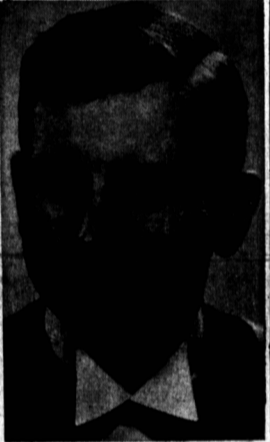
