

Reviews Activities Of Ch'town Free Dispensary

The following report of the supervisor of the Charlottetown Free Dispensary, Mrs. D. Goldie, was read at the annual meeting of the organization on Friday evening:

"Another year has come to a close for the Charlottetown Free Dispensary. It was a fairly successful one considering the difficult times we are living in. We hope that our annual report may arouse the interest of the public in this work so that our Financial Drive we have each spring may prove successful. So many collections taking place in the Spring and Fall makes a discouraging task for both the collectors and those contributing. Now the extremely high cost of living added to this certainly does not improve the situation. However, we hope to raise enough funds to keep open for Free Medication, which is a real necessity especially during an epidemic such as the influenza was this past winter.

"Last May a rather strenuous effort was put forth by the Committee to collect a larger sum of money than usual. We had men out working for us. Both the ladies and the men worked hard and gave up their much needed time to do this. We banked around fifteen hundred dollars which was the best collection up to date, but it was still just enough to cover free medicine as our drug bill the past few years has been in the vicinity of twelve hundred dollars.

"This is quite a lot larger than in years gone by, but medication like everything else has increased in price and the population of Charlottetown and surrounding areas has almost doubled. Sickness also seems to be more widespread. I read in the paper recently that the Boy Scout Campaign realized almost four thousand dollars from Charlottetown alone. The Boy Scouts is a very fine organization, but I feel that the Dispensary is also deserving. If we could even manage to raise two thousand dollars we could give help with groceries during the winter and maybe a little coal, both very necessary and important relief items.

"The coal situation was quite a problem for many of the poor the past winter. I believe all the Churches have a fund for that purpose for those deserving help but I suppose they can just give so much.

In Great Demand

"In my report last year, I mentioned the many different kinds of medicines given out. This year there was a great demand for cod liver oil. What we give comes straight from Newfoundland. With the flat at its peak in February we had a very busy and expensive month. Many calls were made at the homes. I think nearly as much medicine was given out then as all the rest of the winter put together. One hundred and thirty nine doctors' prescriptions were sent in during the year. Fifty of these were new ones and eighty-nine were refills.

"At present there are seventy-nine index cards on file. The majority of these represent whole families, the remaining ones in some cases a single person in poor health, others elderly persons living alone, some with Old Age Pensions but others not quite old enough for the pension.

"There were six deaths through the year. Four persons moved to homes, one to the Infirmary and three others to Beach Grove. Three families moved away.

"Christmas was quite a pleasant surprise as I thought it was going to be a real struggle, but people were very generous with donations. One well known wholesaler, always a good friend to the Dispensary, was especially generous about sending groceries. One of our popular business men again sent us sausages which always make a good filler. We boxed eighty dinners which from all reports were quite satisfactory and much appreciated. Most of these were delivered right to the doors. The chickens, though cold storage and Grade C, made good eating when cooked. We filled shopping bags for the children of the families. A shopping bag may not sound like much but when I counted the cost of the contents of one bag for a large family, it came to around twenty dollars. The Rotary Club as usual sent in their very generous cheque of one hundred and fifty dollars which gave our funds a much needed boost.

"The Kinmen's Club went around on St. Valentine's Day with many needy families.

"I thought the citizens of the town responded very generously with aid to the families who were burned out in January.

"The sudden passing of Sister John of the Cross was a great loss and a shock to many. She did work amongst the poor and will be greatly missed.

"In closing we wish to express our appreciation and thank many of our friends who have helped us in any way."

Ayrshire Breeders Purchase Young Sire In Scotland

The Prince Edward Island Ayrshire breeders have purchased a seven month old calf in Scotland, the second Scottish sire that Island Ayrshire men have purchased in recent months.

The decision to buy the young sire was made by a committee of the breeders association. The men had previously agreed to buy two sires but had left the matter of selection to the committee. The first sire was bought by Mr. Fred MacRae for the Association.

Name of the seven month old sire is Dunduff Gilt Edge. He is closely related on the sire's side to Burton Duellist, the animal purchased by Mr. MacRae in April. The Gilt Edge sire was purchased in Scotland by Mr. R. O. Biggs of Ontario and repurchased by the local men.

Mr. MacRae saw both animals in Scotland. They will be leaving Scotland later this month but it will probably be about the first of August before they arrive in this province after undergoing the necessary quarantine period in Quebec.
