

Hamilton Keeps Hopes Up With Close 8-7 Victory

HAMILTON (CP) — Joe Zuger kicked a 47-yard single on the last play of the game to give Hamilton Tiger-Cats an 8-7 victory over Winnipeg Blue Bombers in a Canadian Football League interlocking game Monday.

The victory kept alive Hamilton's faint chance of catching Ottawa Rough Riders for first place in the East. Winnipeg tied the score 7-7 with an unconverted touchdown by Bill Cooper in the third quarter and contained Hamilton for much of the fourth.

But the Ticats, with a stiff wind of 20 to 35 miles an hour at their backs, finally worked their way over the midfield stripe and with four seconds showing on the clock Zuger punted from the Winnipeg 47. The ball sailed deep into the Bomber end zone where Cooper caught it. He cut to his left and dashed for the goal line in an effort to run the ball out.

He was nailed just inches short by Dick Cohee, who bounced him out of bounds for the winning point.

The Ticats got all their points on kicks. Don Sutherland booted a 44-yard field goal early in the second quarter and Zuger followed with three singles of 57 yards, 45 yards and 55 yards.

That wiped out a 1-0 lead Winnipeg took on Norm Winton's single on a wide field goal attempt from the Hamilton 33 in the first quarter.

Hamilton led 6-1 at the half. The Ticats made it 7-1 on a single by Sutherland early in the third quarter, but Winnipeg drew even on a circus catch of a 38-yard pass by Ken Ploen playing his first game since recovering from a bruised kidney suffered a week ago.

Cooper snared the pass over his shoulder between the Hamilton goal posts. Winton's convert was wide and led the score tied 7-7.

MONTREAL (CP) — Toronto Argonauts kept their slim Eastern Football Conference playoff hopes alive here Monday afternoon when they downed Montreal Alouettes 9-8 on the strength of Dave Mann's single with less than one minute left to play.

Mann sailed his 40-yard punt into the end zone despite the presence of three Alouette defenders stationed there to return the kick. The ball bounced and ended up outside the sidelines.

He also saved the slim one-point margin when he stationed himself in the end zone and kicked out a Gino Baretta punt from the Toronto 46-yard line that would have tied the score in the final play of the game.

The Argos now have a 3-8 record and Montreal are 5-6. Both teams have three games remaining in their schedule.

In addition to his game-winning single Mann contributed a single on a 57-yard kick in the third quarter.

34 Marks Met In Dodger-Oriole Series Last Week

BALTIMORE (AP) — Los Angeles Dodgers, who established a major league record for most shutouts suffered by a pennant winner, set a World Series record for most consecutive scoreless innings while losing four straight games to Baltimore Orioles.

After Dave McNally gave up a run in the third inning of the opener of the best-of-seven series, Oriole pitchers held the Dodgers scoreless for 33 innings. The old record was 28 innings by New York Giants against Philadelphia Athletics in 1905.

In all, 34 records were broken and tied during the 1966 Series.

Bauer Goes Back With No Worry

BALTIMORE (AP) — Before heading for his Prairie Village, Kan., home and rest and relaxation, Baltimore Oriole manager Hank Bauer may pull out an index card marked "needs for 1967; and cross an item off the list.

In mid-August when Baltimore was winging toward its first American League pennant, Bauer listed six ways to improve the Orioles for next season. No 1 was the addition of another starting pitcher.

Despite the huge league lead at the time, Bauer had cause for worry. Several starting pitchers were ailing and healthy ones had little staying power.

The staff finished with 33 complete games—close to the all-time low even for also-runs. An outstanding bullpen, headed by Stu Miller and Eddie Fisher, picked up the slack.

Bauer said his frequent use of the bullpen was successful, so why worry. But a couple of relievers are advancing in age and it would be difficult to stage a repeat performance of 1966.

LOOKED LIKE TROUBLE

When Steve Barber, Baltimore's most experienced starter, was not made eligible for the World Series because of recurring elbow trouble, starting pitchers appeared to be a real problem.

So, what happened? Jim Palmer, Wally Bunker and Dave McNally hurried consecutive shutouts in the final

three games after Moe Drabowsky—the only reliever used by Baltimore—blanked Los Angeles Dodgers on one hit over the final 6 2-3 innings of the opener.

Significantly, the Orioles may have another Kiddie Korps pitching staff in the making. Of the World Series starters, McNally is the oldest at 28. Bunker is 21 and Palmer 20.

Eddie Watt, a 24-year-old rookie who posted a 9-6 record as both a reliever and starter this year, adds another strong arm, along with Frank Bertina, 22, John Miller, 25, Gene Beardsley, 25.

Joining the team next year will be 24-year-old Tom Phoebus, who hurled two consecutive shutouts late in the season after being recalled from the minor leagues. Ed Barnowski, 16-game winner at Rochester this season, is 23.

In 1960, when the Orioles made their first bid for a pennant, a young pitching staff of Milt Pappas, Jerry Walker, Jack Fisher, Chuck Estrada and Barber was nicknamed the Kiddie Korps.

The ailing Barber is the only member remaining. The other four were either traded or sent to the minors with sore arms.

If he returns healthy in 1967, Barber will be the dean of the starters at age 28.

BALTIMORE (AP) — The picture of dejection, Don Drysdale sat on the little stool by his dressing room in Memorial Stadium Sunday.

His head was down. It was many moments before he cared to speak and then it was almost a whisper.

One mighty blow, a home run by Frank Robinson in the fourth inning, had spelled disaster and the clinching 1-0 World Series win for Baltimore Orioles.

Said Drysdale: "I got the ball up, maybe a little too high. It was a fast ball. It was just one of those things."

Manager Walter Alton managed to smile through it all. Someone asked how he really felt.

"You fellows don't want to know about hits and plays, you just want to payche me. Well, if you want to know the truth, I'd feel a lot better if we'd have won, but I'm not going to jump off a bridge."

Was there any particular turning point in the game? "I thought Willie Davis' catch might turn it around — but it didn't."

Alton referred to Davis' spectacular leaping catch at the 410-foot mark of Boog Powell's smash in the fourth that robbed Powell of a home run.

Willie Davis was asked if maybe the catch in a manner redeemed himself for the two fly balls he dropped at Los Angeles last Thursday.

Willie, munching on a hamburger, replied: "Naw."

He added that the ball was caught just behind the seven-foot fence.

Second baseman Jimmy LeFebvre summed it up for the Dodgers when he said, "No, the pitching didn't really surprise us too much. They've got a good ball club. They seemed to play flawless ball."

American League president Joe Cronin came in to congratulate Alton. "We caught you when you weren't hitting," Cronin said.

"I'm going over where it's merrier," Alton finally said.

Nicklaus Rows With Referee And Loses Match To Player

VIRGINIA WATERS, England (AP) — A big golfing row involving Jack Nicklaus and a referee went on Sunday, 24 hours after South Africa's Gary Player beat the American 6 and 4 in the final of the world match play tournament.

The match will be remembered because of the unprecedented scene between Nicklaus and referee Col. Tommy Duncan, former British Walker Cup captain, on the ninth hole of the 36-hole final over Wentworth West Course Saturday.

The heated exchange came after the American hooked his drive into a ditch. Nicklaus claimed an advertising sign was in his line to the flag. He wanted to drop without penalty.

He said a local rule permitted him to do this if an immovable structure was in his line. Duncan insisted the situation did not warrant a free drop and ordered Nicklaus to play the ball as it lay.

CONCEDED HOLE

Nicklaus continued to argue. Finally he played a wedge shot short of the green and then conceded the hole.

The American told Duncan he thought it was "a bum decision" and on the next hole Duncan offered to bow out to another referee.

Nicklaus accepted. It was the first time in British golf history that a referee had quit in the middle of a big-time match.

"I still stick by my decision," Duncan said. "The sign was 60 yards from Nicklaus and he could play to the green."

Nicklaus said: "I still maintain I was entitled to drop the ball out of the line of the advertising sign. I guess my blood pressure went soaring."

Player said: "Jack came up to me on the 10th hole and said he had asked for another referee. I was shocked. I have never heard of that."

British newspapers made the incident front-page news Sunday.

Player shot 13 birdies and won \$14,000. Nicklaus earned \$8,400.
