

IN MEMORIAM

MAYNARD W. SANDERSON

The death of Maynard W. Sanderson occurred in Midgell on the morning of March 16th, as the result of a tragic accident. He was in his usual good health as he left the woods with a team of horses. Having procured his load of wood, he was on his way home when a death intervened, caused by a cerebral hemorrhage. A short time after he was discovered by a neighbour but despite medical aid nothing could be done.

Mr. Sanderson, who was in his sixty-seventh year at the time of his sudden passing, was born in Greenwich, Conn. He was a member of the United States and lived here for a number of years. Later he returned and took up farming on the Church Road. A few years ago he disposed of his property and bought a farm in Midgell where he became known as a very successful farmer and obliging neighbour. He was well and favorably known by all. Especially in his own country which was a centre of his life and his family.

He was a faithful attendant of the United Church where he served on the Board of Stewards for many years. As treasurer, he was successful in his efforts to improve the time towards the improvement of the Midgell and Marie Cemeteries and their well kept and pleasing appearance will be a remembrance of his work and interest.

Mr. Sanderson was also a veteran of the First World War, where he served in the trenches and in the fields of France. He was a faithful and loyal servant of all that pertained to the best interests of the community, church and home. His genial smile and willing hands will be sorely missed by those who were privileged to know him.

A short service was held at his residence on Friday, March 19th, before the flag-draped casket was transferred to Marie United Church. The funeral services at the same church were conducted by the minister, Rev. R. A. MacLeod, assisted by two former members Rev. W. A. Paterson and J. W. MacPherson. Mr. MacLeod sent a message of hope and comfort to those so sorely and suddenly bereaved. The hymns sung, all acquaintances of the deceased, included: "Safe In The Arms of Jesus", "When The Day of 'Toll is Done", "Sweet By and By" and a trio composed by "The Valley".

The profession of flowers that packed the casket and the very same congregation which packed the Church and overflowed into the Church yard were a source of comfort to the sorrowing relatives and a tribute of respect to this good friend and servant.

He leaves to mourn a sorrowing widow and daughter, Eileen. One daughter predeceased him a few years previous. Also left to mourn are the following brothers and sisters: Guy, New York; Harry, Merrill; Jack, Charlottetown; Howard, Western Canada; Gordon, St. Peter's Bay; Helen (Mrs. Frank Knox), New Hampshire; Mrs.

Interment took place in Midgell Cemetery. The Morell and St. Peter's Bay branches of the Canadian Legion attended in a body and had their Committal service at the grave under the leadership of Byron Webster, and Bulgar B. Doiron of Charlottetown who sounded the Last Post.

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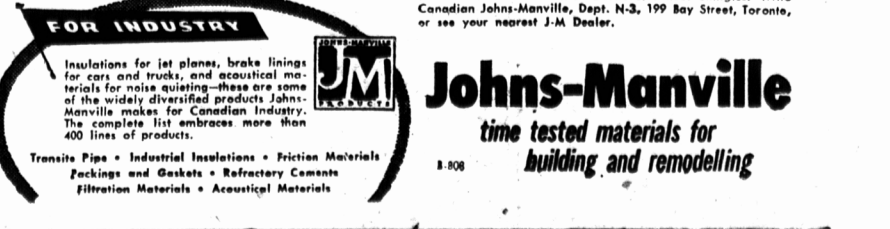


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
