French From 8 Provinces Don't Want Separation

MONTREAL (CP) — French-speaking Canadians from eight provinces have served notice on Quebec that they don't want to see it separate from the rest of Canada. The rejection of separatism as a possible solution to Canada's constitutional problems came Saturday in a brief drafted in the name of the country's "French language minorities" for presentation to the Estates General of French Canada.

The brief also made a strong plea for equal voting rights for all delegates attending the weekend gathering. It noted that non-Quebec delegates had been invited to participate on a limited basis, with the right to vote only on matters related to Quebec's dealings with other governments in Canada and with the French-speaking minorities in the other provinces.

The brief said any decisions made by the Estates General "will have a direct effect on all French language groups," and therefore all delegates should have the right to vote on all questions. This proposal was approved overwhelmingly by the "minority" delegates in a show of hands.

Mayor Jean Drapeau of Montreal in a welcoming address said French Canada cannot remain satisfied with mere survival but must "set out on the road that leads to dignity, expansion and emancipation."

French-speaking Canadians must become "masters of their own destiny," Jacques - Yvan Morin, the University of Montreal professor who heads the Estates General, told delegates that "despite certain misleading signs, the French-Canadian nation has never been in such a serious position."

Quebec's chartered banks held only 6.2 per cent of Canadian bank assets, at the end of 1965 and its trust companies 6.8 per cent of the Canadian total.

"Our social life is similar. With 40 per cent of the unemployed in Canada and a standard of living 10 per cent below the Canadian average and 27 per cent below that of Ontario, it would be surprising if it were otherwise."

"Expenditures in the second quarter were at an annual rate of \$57,100,000,000. The rate in last year's third quarter was \$50,700,000,000."

The publication says it was not known how much steel would be going into the defence and war markets, adding: "While 1,405,000 net tons of mill products—about five per cent of mill shipments—must be available this quarter for defence, set-asides are not an adequate measure of use."

Steel says that downturns in the construction and automotive industries mean that December won't be a robust steel month, but added that it wasn't expected to be.

Steadiness continues to mark production of steel for ingots and castings. Steel estimates that the output last week was unchanged from the previous week's 2,565,000 net tons.

CONTRACEPTIVE ODOR SOUGHT

CAMBRIDGE, England (Reuters) — Delicate French perfume that women dab behind their ears might actually act as a sort of contraceptive, a sex scientist said here.

Conception slumps to its lowest rate of the year during Christmas—when 50 per cent of perfume sales are made.

Professor Alan Packes, head of the physiology and reproduction department at London University, is examining the possibility of a contraceptive perfume.

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Steel Needs For Viet Nam Are Growing

CLEVELAND (AP) — Steel magazine says increased amounts of steel will be required for the war in Viet Nam and to meet defence needs.

The weekly journal of metalworking, published Sunday, says the trend could be sensed from the rising U.S. expenditures for national defence and "continued escalation" in the war.

"After six consecutive quarters of rise, national defence expenditures in the third quarter pushed to an annual rate of \$61,300,000,000, and you can expect another gain in the current quarter," the magazine says.

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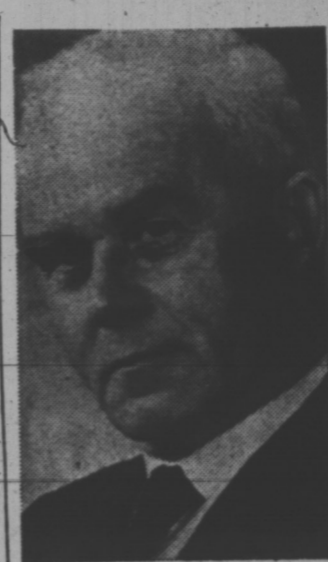

AMC To Seek Car Business In Red Camp

DETROIT (AP) — American Motors Corp. officials said Saturday they plan a drive aimed at selling automobiles behind the Iron Curtain.

If successful, AMC would be the first U.S. auto firm to sell cars directly in the Soviet Union or other Communist nations in eastern Europe.

"I'm going to Russia and I am going to sell some cars there," said William S. Pickett, AMC's vice-president for international automotive operations.

Pickett expressed hope that the project would be under way next year "if we can work out some kind of selling arrangement."

AMC's sales in the United States have been sliding, but its overseas picture is bright, with its 1966 exports setting a high of 45,961 vehicles.

Pickett said AMC could build cars in Argentina and sell them to Iron Curtain countries, which, in turn, would pay for the automobiles by shipping steel to American Motors.

"We've done this before," he said. "We shipped cars to Colombia from our Belgian plant and took payment in coffee."

Cancer Society Holds Workshop
