Nursing Instructor Glad To Be Working In Canada

David Khokhar, a nursing instructor at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, School of Nursing, was born in Slakt City, India in 1932. He received his academic education at a Christian Mission School, basic nursing instruction at a Salvation Army Mission Hospital and his nursing diploma at one of the world's largest mission hospitals, the Christian Medical College and Hospital in Vellore, South India. (This medical organization is supported by 60 religious denominations from throughout the world.)

Mr. Khokhar arrived in Halifax on June 10th, 1966, by liner directly from India. He had a short stop-over for emigration and customs clearance, then boarded a plane for Charlottetown. His first impression of P.E.I. as his plane flew over: "I immediately thought of the biblical land of milk and honey."

Mr. Khokhar feels that the conditions in India would awe most Canadians, that is, the crowded cities and the vast areas, where poor living conditions prevail.

New wing construction is ear-marked for July 31, 1967, completion. The addition will contain a lecture room, science laboratory, 10 classrooms, and washrooms.
