Elections Are Assured In Three S'side Wards

SUMMERSIDE — The nomination of Dr. Gilbert J. Gallant as a candidate for councillor for the West Ward was the only surprise in yesterday's civic nominations at Summerside, and assured that elections will be held next Tuesday in all three Summerside wards.

Dr. Gallant will be opposing Leo Wood, a member of the present council, while in each of the other two wards three candidates have been nominated. In the Centre Ward, Dr. H. E. Clark, also a member of the present council, has J. Ernest Morrison and Mercier Mullen as contestants.

In the East Ward, the present council member Elmer Newson has renominated and his reelection is being opposed by Edmund F. Arsenault and Llewellyn Rogers. Mr. Rogers, 67, is Maritime Central Airways agent at Summerside. He resides with his wife and two of their seven children at their home on Upper Granville Street.

Edmund F. Arsenault, 47, a salesman with Robinson's Bakery, is a veteran of World War Two, past grand knight of Summerside Council Knights of Columbus, a member of the K. of C. State Council and a member of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion. With his wife and two children he resides on Milton Avenue.

Elmer Newson, 46, a C.N.R. clerk, has been a member of the town council for the past two years. He is married, has three children, and resides on Arcoona Street.

Mercier Mullen, 39, a buyer for Canada Packers, veteran of World War Two, is grand knight of Summerside Council Knights of Columbus, president of the Summerside Lions Club and vice-president of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion.
