ISLAND BACON.—The cargo of the steamer Gallia on her last trip from Halifax included a large quantity of bacon shipped by Mr. Rattenbury, of Charlottetown.

THE STANLEY left Georgetown at the usual time this morning. She will not leave on return to Georgetown until tomorrow morning having been detained in Pictou by snow.

MORE COAL.—According to the St. John Telegraph a coal discovery is reported to have been made by Indian parties some miles below Fredericton.

HYDRANT DAMAGED.—The hydrant at the Apothecaries Hall corner was damaged last evening during the progress of the fire. The damage was made all right again by the waterworks employes as soon as possible.

HOCKEY.—It is probable that the Wanderers will play matches in St. John, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, and New York, during the season. These are in addition to the matches at Charlottetown and Summerside.

HUNGRY BURGLARS.—One night last week burglars entered the butcher shop of John M. Murdoch, Pictou, and carried off about 100 pounds of corned beef; 50 pounds mutton; 30 pounds lamb; 5 tongues; 40 pounds ham; 8 or 10 pounds pork, and some roasts of beef. They also carried off a lamp, a basket and a knife.

FRUIT GROWERS.—At the preliminary meeting of the Fruit Growers Association held on Friday last, presided over by the Vice President, Edward Bayfield, Esq., Q. C., it was decided to call in a general meeting at the Market Hall, on Tuesday, the eight day of March at 2 o'clock. In the meantime, all who wish to read papers thereat on fruit subjects can send their names to the Secretary, Joseph Stewart, Esq., Atkins Ferry, Montague.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—Dr. Anderson's paper on "The Equipment of the Teacher," read at the meeting of the teachers institute on Saturday night, is described as a clear and forcible exposition of the subject based on high ideals. An interesting discussion followed in which the Superintendent of Education, Dr. Taylor, Percy Pope, T. C. James, S. F. Hodgson and others took part. The vote of thanks at the close was moved by Mr. Seaman seconded by Mr. McCready. Mr. Ewen Stewart presided. The next paper in the course will be read by Rev. Dr. Morrison.

A BRIGHT PROSPECT FOR CHEESE.—The Montreal Star reports that the local market for cheese, although not characterized by any decided increase in activity, rules very firm, as all authorities seem to agree that remaining stocks will rapidly find their way into consumptive channels during the next four months. A well known operator has recently pointed out that the English demand for States and Canadian cheese is figured at 65,000 boxes weekly—that is, when fine and finest cheese can be bought at 53 to 63 per pound, or at quotations which the retailers are now selling at throughout Great Britain. The general view of the situation, therefore is decidedly a bright one.

ISLAND POTATOES.—The Portland Me., Press says: The schooner Lucy W. Dwyer, owned by Charles Gupill, arrived Tuesday after a hard trip. The Dwyer left here about two months ago and went to Prince Edward Island, where she took in a cargo of 3,370 bushels of potatoes, for which 30 cents a bushel was paid. The duty on them is 25 cents a bushel, and potatoes now bring in Portland market from 95 to \$1 per bushel. Capt. McMill reports that on the second day, out from Georgetown the main boom broke, and from that time until Monday he has not had a favorable breeze. He has been four weeks and one day on the return passage.
